DEATH OF MR. WM. NUNAN.

The death took place to-day, after a somewhat prolonged illness of Mr. William Nunan at his residence, Monaleen. The deceased was a prominent figure in local politics in the early days of the land agitation, and for some time after the passing of the Local Government, Ireland, Act. He was a member of the Board of Guardians, and of the Limerick County Council, and at one time unsuccessfully contested the East Division of the County of Limerick in the Parnellite interest. For a long time back, since he ceased to be a member of the County Council, he practically lived a retired life, taking but little or no part in public matters. Mr Nunan was about seventy years of age, and his death is greatly regretted by a large circle of friends.
