TRAM ACCIDENT IN DUBLIN.

Several Injured.

On Sunday night a Dublin to Dalkey tram capsized at the corner of Merrion-square, East, and Lower Mount street, and twenty-one persons, including the driver and conductor, were more or less seriously injured. Several were taken to hospital. It is unknown how the accident occurred.

It is satisfactory to find that up to the present no theory of malicious blocking or obstruction of the line has been put forward. The police report is not yet complete, and it is understood that it deals mainly with the names of those injured and the bare facts of the occurrence.
