Alluding to the sacredness of contracts, the Bishops say that it is the bond of human inter-course, the mainstay of fair dealing, and the basis of business enterprise everywhere. Dis-cegard of contracts by workers may have its counterpart in disregard of contracts by employers, just as the sympathetic strike is matched by the sympathetic lock-out. In the legitimate effort to eliminate sweaters and secure fair conditions of employment the advantage of having employment and the need to secure its continuance should never be overlooked.

McNeice met on Thur-day night at the Town Hall, in Committee of the Whele House, to consider a scheme of blood priving and asphalting a number of streets and sidepaths in the city, and which was submitted for approval by the Borough Engineer, Mr J. J. Peacocke. There was a large attendance of members, and after a prolonged consideration of the proposals it was decided to recommend the Borough Council to block-pave the following thoroughfures, the estimated cost being £40.000:—Clyde Road, Henry-street, Upper William street, Mulgrave-street, Sexton-street, Gerald Griffin-street, Factory-street, Earsfield-street, Sarsfield Brilge, Roxboro' road, North Circular road, Athlunkard street, Upper Athlunkard street, Circular road, Mallow New enham Henry street. street, Ryve's - Path, Charles street, and street. Ryve's Path, Charles street, and High Street. They also decided on recommending that the following streets be asphalted mending that the following streets be asphalted at an expenditure of £7,000.—The Crescent, George street, Patrick-street, Rueland street, Dénmark-street, Honry-street (outside the Franciscan-Church), Thomas-street; Catherine-street (to Gleptworth-street), Little Catherine-street, and Upper Henry-street. It was likewise decided to recommend that a further sum of £7,000 should be expended on asphalting the sidewalks on several of the principal thoroughfares. The scheme will have to be ratified by the Council, previous to an application being made to the Local Government Board for a loan to carry out the works.
