CHARGE AGAINST JAMES MARRINAN

ACCUSED DISCHARGED

At a special court at the County Courthouse, Ennis, on Wednesday, Mr. George M'Elroy, R.M., in the chair.

James Marrinan, charged with misprision of felony in connection with the murder of John Kildea, at Derrymore, was again up on remand.

Mr. F. F. Cullinan, Crown Solicitor, who prosecuted, asked his worship to discharge the defendant, but Marrinan was to understand that the Crown did not by any means abandon the case against him, and he might be brought on summons at any time. Marrinan was then discharged.

MacManus Funeral Recalled

San Francisco papers chronicle the death of a veteran Irish Nationalist. Daniel J. MacCarthy, the originator of the movement for the transfer of the remains of Terence Bellew MacManus from America to Ireland in 1861. Of the few now left who accompanied the memorable procession of the MacManus funeral through the streets of Dublin on November 10th, 1861, Dr. Sigerson and Mr. T. D. Sullivan may be mentioned. Mr. MacCarthy was born in the city of Cork in 1826, and joined the Fenian movement, subsequently settling in California. Throughout his long life of 88 years he adhered to the principles of true Nationality, and he was for years a tower of strength to the Irish cause in San Francisco. Although in recent years, by reason of old age, he was not able to take an active part in the National movement, he remained true to his old principles to the end.

Kilfinane Man's Death

The death has occurred at Kilfinane of Mr. Patrick Thornhill, senior, who was extensively engaged in the cattle trade. A man of great personal worth, he is much regretted locally, and sincere sympathy is extended to his daughters, Rev. Mother Margret Mary and Sister Clare, Presentation Convent, Limerick; Mrs M'Carthy, Fermoy, and to his son Mr. P. J. Thornhill.

Gaelic Activity in Tipperary

Strenuous organising is going on in North Tipperary just now, by Sean O'Murthaille, Gaelic League Organiser, and a band of North Tipperary Gaels are straining every nerve endeavouring to bring that locality to the front in the Gaelic world. There is to be a great public demonstration in Nenagh on St Patrick's Day, under Gaelic League auspices. A procession is to take place at one p.m., to be followed by a public meeting.

Aged Lady's Will

Miss Anastasia Ryan, a native of Clonoulty, County Tipperary, whose death is announced at Galong, New South Wales, in her 81st year, left £300 to the priests of Mount Mellery for Masses, £1,000 for a monument over her grave, and £2,000 to relatives in Ireland.

Brutal Husband Gets Jail

At the Listowel Petty Sessions, before Mr. A. Irwin, R.M., a man named Richard Hayes, of no occupation, was sentenced to two months' imprisonment with hard labour for assaulting his wife by striking her on forehead with a bottle, inflicting a serious wound.

The steamer Wheat Ear, of Cardiff, collided with Tarbert Pier when about discharging part of a cargo of flour. It is reported the damage to the quay amounts to £200. The vessel was uninjured. The engines, it is said, refused to act.
