MacManus Funeral Recalled

### San Francisco papers chronicle the death of

a veteran Irish Nationalist. Daniel J. Mac-Carthy, the originator of the movement for the transfer of the remains of Terence Bellew MacManus from America to Ireland in 1861. Of the few now left who accompanied the memorable procession of the MacManus funeral through the streets of Dublin on November 10th, 1861, Dr. Sigerson and Mr. T. D. Sullivan may be mentioned. Mr. MacCarthy was born in the city of Cork in 1826, and joined the Fenian movement, subsequently settling in California. Throughout his long life of 88 years he adhered to the principles of true Nationality, and he was for years a tower of strength to the Irish cause in San Francisco. Although in recent years, by reason of old age, he was not able to take an active part in the National movement, he remained true to his old principles to the end.
