### Death of Mr. P. A. Johnson

Deep and widespread regret, in which we fully share, has been occasioned by the death of Mr Philip A Johnson, which occurred at his residence, Weston Cottage, Rosbrien, on Friday evening, after a protracted illness. The deceased, who passed away in the prime of manhood, was a gentleman of scholarly attainments, was highly popular, and occupied a responsible position in one of the principal firms in the city. He was a brother of Mr John J Johnson, manager Grand Canal Company, Limerick, to whom universal sympathy is extended. The remains were removed to St. Michael's R. C. Church at 8 p.m. on Saturday evening, and the funeral left St Michael's R C Church, at one p.m. yesterday, for the family burial ground at Killaloe. A large number of people of the city accompanied the remains for a considerable distance outside Limerick. A feature of the cortege was the presence of the members of St. Gregory Section of the Confraternity, of which deceased was a late Prefect. The funeral was augmented en route by friends at Harold's Cross, Clonlara, O'Brien's Bridge, and Ross. At Killaloe, where the sad news of Mr. Johnson's death was received with very great regret, nearly all the people of the town met the remains on arrival at the churchyard. A list of names of those who attended would be impossible. The prayers at the graveside were recited by Rev Father Carroll, C.C., and Rev Father Thornhill, C.C. St Michael's. The chief mourners were—Michael, Simon, and John (brothers). Wreaths were sent by Misses A and B Mulcaire, Askeaton; Miss Cissie Morgan, &c.
