### Kilrush Quarter Sessions

#### DECREES AGAINST TENANTS

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

At the Kilrush Quarter Sessions on yesterday, before County Court Judge Bodkin, K.C., a number of decrees against tenants at the suit of the Irish Land Commission were given for failure to pay their instalments. The business to be transacted at these Sessions is of an unusually light character. His Honor only sat for a very short time yesterday and adjourned until to-day.
