Gaelic League Envoys

Arrival in New York

INTERVIEW WITH MISS NELLY O'BRIEN

The *New York World* of April 6th to hand says:—A bunch of winsome colleens who will travel through the United States in behalf of the Gaelic League lecturing and showing Irish arts, crafts and industries arrived on the White Star liner Baltic yesterday morning. They are Miss Nelly O'Brien, who says she is descended from King Brian Boru; Miss Eithne Kelly, of the O'Kellys of Connaught, renowned in ancient Ireland; Miss Teresa Halpin, who has won more than five hundred prizes in dancing, violin playing and singing, and Miss Anna Cassidy, who represents the industrial side of the exhibition in the working of a Donegal carpet-weaving loom. Both Miss O'Brien and Miss Kelly are skilled in designing for embroidery and other decorative work. The girls, under the management of Fionan M'Collum of Kerry, who has been head organiser for the Gaelic League, will go first to Worcester, Mass., where a Gaelic fair is under way, and will be seen here in May. "We bear greetings," said Miss O'Brien, "to America from the Gaels of Ireland, and especially from An Craobhín (the Little Branch), Dr. Douglas Hyde, who has the warmest remembrance of the kindness he received when he was in America eight years ago. Irish is now taught in nearly 3,300 primary schools. In the Intermediate Schools—thanks largely to Canon Arthur Ryan, of Tipperary—the status of the language has been greatly improved. The National University, which consists of the affiliated colleges of Dublin, Galway and Cork, had made Irish an essential for entrance examination. We hope that our exhibition will show that our country is on the upgrade materially, as well as intellectually, and that you will help us to realise our ideal of a self-supporting, self-contained and united Ireland." There were on the pier two members of the Gaelic League dressed in ancient Irish costume, which resembles the Scotch Highlanders' garb. In the exhibitions the Misses O'Brien and Kelly wear costumes modelled after the Irish fashions of three centuries ago.

Donnellan, and carried by intrigue at the meeting of the Board of Guardians on the 1st instant; that we strongly condemn such action, and call on every Nationalist member of the Board to be in his place on Wednesday, 15th instant, in support of Mr. Rahilly's notice of motion to rescind the slur standing in the books of that historic Board."

Mr. Thomas Hartigan seconded, and said other public bodies through the country threw such resolutions into the waste paper basket.

The Chairman said the resolution was a proper one. He regretted his absence on the occasion of the snatched vote, but he would be at the Board meeting next Wednesday to support Mr. Rahilly against the O'Brienite intrigue.

Mr. J. Maher said it was amazing such a resolution could be adopted by a Nationalist Board of men from Limerick and Clare under

East Clare Sensation

HOTEL PROPRIETOR COMMITS SUICIDE

A determined case of suicide occurred in the town of Tulla, East Clare, on Saturday night, when Mr. Hanifin, proprietor of the Commercial Hotel, cut his throat. Deceased had been in Ennis during the day with his wife, and after his return was noticed to be somewhat peculiar in his manner and very restless, going from room to room. He entered the apartments of District Inspector Smith, who was staying in the Hotel, and announced his intention of cutting his throat. No serious attention was, however, paid to his actions. Soon after he took his case of razors from his own room, and going downstairs passed through the kitchen to the yard door, and on the threshold taking out one of the razors and drawing it across his throat, inflicting a terrible gash. He fell forward in the yard, and died in a few minutes. The terrible event caused a great sensation in the town, and general sympathy is felt with his widow. Mr. Hanifin was a native of Castleisland, County Kerry. Mr. Frost held an inquest on the deceased yesterday, and a verdict of suicide while temporarily insane was found.

West Limerick Fatality

RESPECTABLE FARMER KILLED

A sad and distressing fatality occurred near Broadford, County Limerick, on Friday last, the victim being a respectable farmer named James Enright, who lived at Barimore, and was aged about seventy years. It appears that Mr. Enright left his home to proceed to the Parish Church, Broadford, and when about half a mile from the village, in company with his daughter-in-law, his pony took flight down the incline. Mrs. Enright was thrown out of the car, but was happily unhurt. Apparently Mr. Enright attempted to get off too, for his trousers were caught in the draught hook, and so he was held suspended whilst his head came repeatedly in contact with the ground, and he sustained shocking injuries. Father Wall was quickly in attendance, but life was extinct.

TIPPERARY MAN'S FATE

A respectable farmer named Patrick Ryan, who resided at Behamore, about eight miles from Nenagh, was present at a wake on his brother, William, who died on the previous evening, and with whom he lived, and whilst partaking of some refreshment, a piece of meat he was eating stuck in his throat, and he died almost immediately. Mr. James O'Brien, Coroner for North Tipperary, held an inquest on the remains, and evidence having been heard, the jury returned a verdict of death from asphyxiation.

ACTION OF ENNISTYMON GUARDIANS

There are 3,706 people in the district, 2,891 of whom speak Irish freely, 30 knowing no English.
