FATALLY BURNED

Limerick Woman's Death

TRAGIC OCCURRENCE IN THE CITY

ACCIDENT IN ST. JOHN'S PRESBYTERY A very sad accident resulting in loss of life occurred at St. John's Presbytery, Limerick, last evening. It appears that shortly before six o'clock, Miss Moloney aged 55 years, housekeeper at the Presbytery, was engaged at the kitchen range preparing beeswax for floor polishing, when some turpentine, which she was mixing with the beeswax, caught fire. Her clothes became saturated with the mixture and coming in contact with the fire burst into flames. The unfortunate victim of the accident screamed for help, and two of the priests who was in the house came to her assistance. who were in the house came to her assistance. They found Miss Moloney enveloped in flames, and they told her to roll herself on the ground, they at the same time throwing rugs and blankets over her. They succeeded in putting out the flames, but not until the poor woman was seriously burned. The Fire Brigade ambulance was telephoned for, and that conveyance arrived in the short space of about five minutes, and took the woman to St. John's Hospital. Dr. M'Grath arrived some ten minutes later, and all that could be done by him and the good nums of the institution was done to alleviate the victim's sufferings. She was perfectly conscious until death supervened this morning at five o'clock. The police at John-street station and the Coroner were

communicated with, but the latter did not deem an inquest necessary on hearing the facts. One of the priests in assisting to extinguish the flames got his fingers slightly burned. The deceased was a native of Ahane, County Limerick, and was for two years house keeping at St. John's Presbytery. For 11 years prior to that she was engaged as housekeeper at St. Michael's Presbytery. The priests at St. John's regret exceedingly the sad tragedy. They spoke in the highest terms of praise of their late housekeeper, characterising her as an upright, scrupulous and respectable woman, The sad affair has caused widespread regret.
