FUNERAL OF MR. J. F. WINDLE.

The remains of the late Mr James Fitzgerald Windle, C.E., whose death took place on Friday night, following an operation occasioned by a moto- accident on Easter Monday, were interred at Mount St Lawrence Cemetery on Sunday morning. The remains arrived from Tipperary by the 11.20 train, and were met at the terminus by a large and representative assemblage of citizens who were present to pay a last tribute of respect to the memory of a gentle- man, whose kindly disposition endeared him to a wide circle of friends.
