and history and genius. The main object of our work is to get the people to understand and love and believe in Ireland. How? By education, and the Feis is a splendid educational factor. Talk of your University, and of the desirability of getting its influence to reach the poor man's son. Why, the influence of the Feis reaches the poor man's grandfather. And your seventy-five year old Seanchaldhe or Amhranuidhe is often the most valuable and interesting contributor to the competitions. But for the most part the Feis is for the young, and soon now they will be flocking to the musters of Irish-Ireland." The first Feis held since the establishment of the Gaelic League in 1893 was organised at Ballyvourney, an Irish-speaking district in County Cork. During the twenty-one years that have elapsed since that time the Feis and the Aeridheacht have become familiar and welcome festivals of Irish song, music and dance in every part of the country. In Limerick during the summer and early-autumn months a great many of these fixtures will take place. The first and most important will be the Thomond Feis, which is to take place on the 22nd, 23rd and 24th of May. Either a Feis or an Aeridheacht will be held this year in nearly every part of the county, for the County Committee of the Gaelic League have decided to give every district a direct and practical interest in the work of the Irish Revival Movement. We hope all these festivals will receive a large measure of support, and that the people will give a most and practical proof of the sincerity of their belief in the efforts being made to bring about a genuinely Irish self-centred, self-respecting, and self-reliant Ireland.

Assault on a Major

RETURNED AMERICAN SENT TO PRISON

City Man Arrested

Patrick Sullivan and Cornelius Sexton, of Field, were summoned by Joseph O'Brien, Bowman-street, with assault.

Mr. H. O'B. Moran, solicitor, on behalf of the defendants, said he should apply for adjournment in order to receive instructions.

Mr. O'Sullivan, solicitor, who appeared for the complainant objected, and the magistrate decided in hearing the case.

Mr. Moran then withdrew from the case. Evidence was given by plaintiff to the effect that he was passing through Little Barton-street on the 11th April, when he was attacked by the defendants, knocked down and beaten; he had to be attended to by Mr. Roberts and was unable to work for some days.

There was no defence. Mr. Kelly said it was a case which should go forward for trial.

Mr. Moran re-entered the case and was asked to address the court on a point, when Mr. Bourke objected and said they did not wish to be kept all day.

Mr. Moran—You can object as long as you like. I am addressing the Court.

Mr. Bourke—I am not addressing Mr. Moran. I am addressing the Chairman, and don't want you to address me again.

Mr. Kelly intervened, and said the magistrates decided in sending each defendant to jail for a month with hard labour, and at the expiration of that period to find bail for future good behaviour, otherwise to undergo a further month's imprisonment.

Mr. Moran asked to have the imprisonment increased to five weeks to allow him to apply for a writ of habeas corpus.

Mr. Moran intimated that he would apply to the King's Bench for a certiorari to quash the conviction.

Two young fellows named James Molloy and Denis Ryan were charged and pleaded guilty to the larceny of a hen, the property of Mrs. Morrisson, Farranshore.

Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, solicitor, appeared for the accused, whose parents were ordered to enter into bonds for their future good behaviour.

Christopher Price, a young fellow, was charged with the larceny of a sum of about £100, the property of Mrs. Hanna, International Hotel, O'Connell-street.

Defendant was put back with a view to taking depositions taken.

Christina Murphy was charged with the larceny of a brooch, the property of Mrs. Newell, Catherine-street.

Defendant was convicted and allowed to remain under the Probationers of the First Offence Act.

The Mexican Situation

The most important news from Mexico to-day was to the effect that General Carranza as "First Chief of the Revolution," has accepted the good offices of the Latin Republic mediators in the present trouble between the United States and Mexico. This intimation is said to have raised the hopes of President Wilson for a speedy settlement of the dispute.

VERA CRUZ, THURSDAY NIGHT

Fierce fighting continues at Tampico. The situation at Tuxpan is grave. The French Consul at Mexico City reports that the capture of the French cruiser "Conde," that the Rebels have captured San Luis Potosi. Huerta's downfall is believed to be imminent.

VERA CRUZ, FRIDAY

U. S. Battleship "Louisiana" has left here hurriedly, believed to be for Tampico, where the gravest conditions prevail.

WASHINGTON, FRIDAY

Mr. Bryan announces that General Huerta has agreed to the cessation of hostilities pending mediation. It is believed that mediation will submit a plan for the settling of the Mexican troubles to a Conference to which the United States, Huerta and Carranza will be invited to send representatives.
