### SUDDEN DEATH IN REDEMPTORIST CHURCH

A man named James Mulcahy, aged about 70, died suddenly in the Redemptorist Church, Limerick, this morning whilst engaged in prayer. The deceased, who resided in County View Terrace, Ballinacorra, was an ex-army man, and had been awarded a Victoria Cross for efficient active service. He attended the Confraternity Retreat last week, and was present at the closing ceremonies last night. This morning while at prayer in the church about 11 o'clock he was seen to suddenly collapse. He expired in a few seconds. The Fire Brigade ambulance was immediately summoned by the Redemptorist Fathers, and it arrived with all promptitude, and conveyed the lifeless body of the deceased to his home at once.
