

## A. J. Sexton's Property Sales

The death took place at the Limerick Convent of Mercy yesterday of a young nun, Sister Ita (Miss Rita Connolly), to the great regret of the devoted Sisters of the Community and a wide circle of friends. The deceased was a native of the County, and was a near relative of one of our most esteemed local priests Rev. S. J. Connolly, C.C., St. John's; and she had been a member of the Order for some years, but had been in falling health for some time back. District-Inspector McClelland, R.I.C. was also examined as to statements made by Ryan. This closed the Crown case.

The Attorney-General said he did not mean to discredit Dr. Humphrey's evidence, but rather his theory.

Mr. Lynch, K.C., then addressed the jury on the part of the prisoner, and said that his client was visited with the sad affliction of having his wife addicted to drink, and yet his treatment of her was kindness and consideration itself. On the evidence presented by the Crown it was impossible for them to come to any such conclusion as that put forward by the Crown. The testimony, on the contrary, pointed unmistakably to the innocence of the accused. Dr. Humphrey had been examined, but was it not a remarkable fact that his colleague, Dr. Holmes, who was associated with him in the post mortem had not been produced, although present in court. He should have been produced, and it was no business of the Crown to keep back an important witness. It might be clever advocacy, but it was not fair to the prisoner, John Ryan. It had not been sustained in evidence that any violence was used to this poor woman on the night in question. Quite the contrary, some of the evidence was inconsistent with the theory of violence having been used by the prisoner, as, for instance, the fact that the latter asked his little son to go into the room to see if this poor woman was in bed. It was not conceivable that if the prisoner had murdered his wife he would send his son into the room to see her. In conclusion, he confidently asked for a verdict of acquittal.

John Hayes, a farmer, living in the district, was called to show that Mrs. Ryan was in the habit of falling.

Mr. Denis O'Brien, J.P., who knew the prisoner for years, stated, in reply to Mr. Comyn, that he had the greatest respect for the prisoner, who was a most respectable man, and who had the sympathy of the people in the district in which he lived.

Mr. Comyn, at the conclusion of the evidence, addressed the jury, and suggested that some of the injuries might have been caused while the woman was lying on the bed by the falling of the mortar from the ceiling.

Mr. Hennessey replied for the Crown. After an absence of half an hour the jury returned a verdict of guilty of gross and culpable negligence.

Mr. Justice Dodd said the verdict must be one of manslaughter or not guilty.

The jury again retired, and after a brief interval came back with a verdict of "guilty of manslaughter."

Mr. Justice Dodd sentenced him to three years' penal servitude.
