

those who had borne the brunt of conflict must be well looked after, and not be left to perish by the wayside or in the workhouse.

The resolutions were passed unanimously.

Mr. O'Keefe, inviting the members of the Sub-Committee to the Annual Convention on the 23rd May, said he would, he hoped, have the pleasure of welcoming them in Limerick on that day. Mr. Birrell had said that the speedy completion of land purchase was at least as important as Home Rule. More important still was the completion of the restoration of the evicted tenants, which involved the ingratitude of a nation and the falsehood of a British Government, no novelties to an Irishman. Now, if ever was the time to force this matter to the front. If the matter is to be settled; it would be better it were settled with 103 Irish members at Westminster than with 42. If no redress could be obtained before the passage of the Home Rule Bill, what earthly hope had they, their representation at Westminster being reduced to vanishing point and Parliament at home helpless.

Mr. Yourell, proposing a vote of thanks to the Chairman, said the suffering tenants owed a debt of great gratitude to their Chairman, Mr. O'Keefe, and to Mr. Redmond, the Press, and the Secretary for his work in the cause of the evicted tenants. To Mr. O'Keefe, in particular, their thanks were due; to his energy, enthusiasm, and whole-hearted devotion to the cause of the homeless and landless Irishmen who otherwise have no home in their country.

Mr. Michael Redmond, seconding, said that Mr. O'Keefe deserved well of the evicted tenants, but resolutions were small thanks. Let all who could attend at the Limerick Convention and show that they meant something more than resolutions.

The Chairman proposed that the Mayor of Limerick, Alderman Philip O'Donovan, and the Chairman of the County Council, William Gubbins, Esq., be specially invited to attend the Convention.

Sub-committee meetings are suspended until after the Convention.

Kilmallock (SS. Peter and Paul's) Camogie Team

A correspondent sends us the following cutting from the *Clonmel Nationalist* in reference to the recent inter-county camogie match at Carrick-on-Suir:—"The members of the Kilmallock, County Limerick Camogie (ladies hurling team) Club travelled to Carrick-on-Suir on Friday to meet the local team in a challenge camogie match at Mr. M. Davin's Sports Field, Deerpark. Much interest was manifested locally in the event and there was a very large attendance, especially of ladies, when the game started at 4 p.m. The Kilmallock team had established quite a name for themselves, hence the Carrick team faced the visitors with a good deal of misgiving. When the play started the ball remained in mid-field for a time. Later on the Kilmallock girls got close to the goal on one or two occasions, but was repulsed by the Carrick goal keeper, who sent it into mid-field, whence it was kept going with great briskness till Carrick scored a goal amidst loud applause. Before the end of the first half the Kilmallock girls went very close to the Carrick goal on three or four occasions, but did not succeed in making a goal by the time the half-hour had expired. During the second half the play was very fast and skilful, and ended by both sides remaining just as they were at the end of the first half. The fact that Carrick ladies met such a "crack" team as Kilmallock testifies greatly to their skill as wielders of the caman. Both teams will yet accomplish great work in the camogie field.
