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timately wipe out all such unrinless amuse ments as sports, football and hurling contests, etc. We therefore call on the Irish Members of Parliament to strenuously oppose this subsection or any colourable imitation of same. Copies to be sent to Mr J Redmond, M P; Mr W K Redmond, M P. and Col A Lynch, M P." In support of the resolution, Mr. O'Brien said it was scarcely necessary for him to point out that most of the sport and amusement of this country was carried out under the Gaelic rules. If that Bill was allowed to go to the Statute Book it would wipe out all forms of sport throughout the country. Those sports and games were organised for the purpose of promoting a healthier national spirit throughout the country. It would be the greatest stroke this country ever got if its Sunday sports were prevented. They were innocent, healthy pastimes of which the people were proud, and in which they took a naturally deep interest. They should protest in the most emphatic manner against such action.

Mr. Sheehan had great pleasure in seconding the resolution. He also commended Mr. O'Brien's thoughtfulness and promptness in bringing the resolution forward. They would not have the suppression of Sunday sports and amusements.

Mr. Linnane said he wished to emphasise Mr. O'Brien's very able observations, and to support them as strenuously as he could.

The Chairman said he wished to support the resolution. He had taken, perhaps, a greater interest in the games played on Sundays than many others, and it was the only day on which the people of this country could see their national games played. In England, Wales and Scotland games were played during week days. In those places half-holidays were practically set aside for the purpose, which was not the case in this country. The Gaelic Athletic Association would do all it could to prevent this Bill becoming law, and in that course he knew they would have the support of the Irish members of Parliament. The passing of such a Bill was unnecessary and uncalled for in this country. This country was mostly devoted to agriculture, and Sunday was the only day on which the people had a relaxation rom toil. Their Sunday games and amuser nd the support and patronage of their were theras harmless as they were as more, the passing into law be a curtailment of liberty or the subject-an interference with one on a matter in which anyone might expect the right of choice. The right of harmless amusement on a Sunday afternoon was a matter in which the manhood of Ireland would make a united demand (hear, hear).

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

THE CATTLE DISEASE

Suspicious East Limerick Incident

THE DEPARTMENT TAKING ACTION Action is being taken by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland regarding the extraordinary occurrence which is reported to have recently taken place at Ardpatrick, County Limerick, where it is alleged that two men were seen to have alighted from an unnumbered motor car and to have placed upon the roadside a quantity of hay covered with a powder which is suspected in the neighbourhood to have contained the germs of foot-and-mouth disease. The matter was discussed at length at the last meeting of the East Limerick Executive of the United Irish League, and it was decided to bring the incident before Mr. Redmond, M.P., and Mr. Lundon, M.P. It appears that an affidavit has been sworn by one of the witnesses of the occurrence, who subsequently burned the hay as a precaution. This affidavit has now been forwarded to Mr. Russell, who has sent it to his officials in Dublin, with instructions to investigate the matter.
