THE CATTLE DISEASE

Suspicious East Limerick Incident

THE DEPARTMENT TAKING ACTION
Action is being taken by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland regarding the extraordinary occurrence which is reported to have recently taken place at Ardpatrick, County Limerick, where it is alleged that two men were seen to have alighted from an unnumbered motor car and to have placed upon the roadside a quantity of hay covered with a powder which is suspected in the neighbourhood to have contained the germs of foot-and-mouth disease. The matter was discussed at length at the last meeting of the East Limerick Executive of the United Irish League, and it was decided to bring the incident before Mr. Redmond, M.P., and Mr. Landon, M.P. It appears that an affidavit has been sworn by one of the witnesses of the occurrence, who subsequently burned the hay as a precaution. This affidavit has now been forwarded to Mr. Russell, who has sent it to his officials in Dublin, with instructions to investigate the matter.

Crux at Kilmallock
