Castleconnell Petty Sessions

THE LICENSING LAWS

ALLEGED FISHING OBSTRUCTION

At the Castleconnell Petty Sessions on Monday, before Lord Massy (presiding); Messrs. J. G. Howley, S. B. Quin, P. K. Hogan, N. Humphreys and P. J. Kelly, R.M., Patrick Browne, publican, Mountpelier, was summoned for two breaches of the Licensing Act on Sunday, 17th ult., in having his licensed premises open for the sale of drink, and supply,ing same to Thomas Griffin and William Skehan. Evidence having been given, the defendant was fined in the cumulative penalty of £3 and costs.

William Tucker and Thomas Ryan were the complainants and William Rose and John Mackey the defendants in a summons charging the latter with having on 3rd May last, at Castleconnell, on the River Shannon, resisted or obstructed complainants while lawfully engaged in fishing. Mr. A. Blood-Smyth, solicitor, appeared for the complainants, and Mr. E. Coffey, solicitor, for the defendants. A question of title was involved, and after a protracted hearing the case was adjourned.

On Sunday afternoon the body of a male infant was recovered from the river near St. Michael's Rowing Club Boathouse. The infant was apparently about a week old, and the body was partially decomposed. The remains were removed to the Morgue, and on Monday an inquest was held and an open verdict returned.
