Mr Blood Smyth—There is a difficulty as to the place the dredger should be discharged. Wherever it is put you will have people to object. It should be discharged at high tide.

Mr Pegum—It is a bad thing for themselves that they do not.

Mr Blood Smyth—It is filling up the river. The fishermen are complaining of being wiped out, and the trawling, too, had to be stopped.

Mr Mackey—Would it obviate the difficulty by discharging the dredger at high tide?

Mr Blood Smyth—It would.

Mr Mackey—Why not suggest it to the Harbour Board?

Mr Blood Smyth—It was suggested, but the Harbour Board would not make the change.

Mr Pegum—What objection is there?

Mr Blood Smyth—The objection is this. They go down with the tide, and they find it handier to go this way, waiting below until the tide floods and then they come back on it. If they went inside the Herring Rock, it would make a very great difference, but all the fishermen say they do not go inside. The shore net-men and the trawling men to the number of 100 are concerned in the matter.

Mr Alton—The Harbour Board gave a guarantee that the mud would be dropped inside the Herring Rock.

The subject lapsed, and after disposing of the ordinary business, the meeting adjourned.

COMBAT IN THE AIR.

Zeppelins, Balloons and Aeroplanes Take Part.

The Berlin correspondent of the *Daily Express* writes:—

An aerial combat between Zeppelins, aeroplanes, and balloons has been arranged to take place at Mainz, which will represent a besieged fortified town.

The balloons will attempt to take messages to a town outside not held by the enemy. The Zeppelins will also attempt to deliver messages to the besieged garrison unperceived by the enemy's aeroplanes.

The Zeppelins and balloons will be marked above, and the aeroplanes below with letters unknown to the enemy, and visible only at a distance which would ensure their being effectively fired on. If the enemy correctly report the letters on the Zeppelins the dirigibles will be considered destroyed.
