MR. M. CLANCY, Co.C., CONGRATULATED At a special meeting of the Mungret Branch of the Irish Land and Labour Association held on 31st May, the members took the apportunity of congratulating Mr. Michael cy, .Co.C., on being again returned at the head of the poll as the Nationalist candidate, and a true friend of the labourers; also the other members of the County Council who were also returned mainly by the labour vote, and the labourers who had the good sense to return men whom they can depend on to improve their position, which is not much to be envied at present. There is a very great lack of employment in parts of the county of Limerick at present, and if some prac-tical steps are not taken immediately the labourers will find themselves very badly prepared in the coming winter. Therefore, it is the duty of District and County Councillors to find the means of employment for the labourers of the County Limerick, and much can be done by the responsible members of the Irish Land and Labour Association in bringing these crying grievances before the respective Councils, members of which should have the welfare of the labourers at heart, and we honestly believe they have. There are prominent Na-tional members of the Limerick County Council who long before to day stood as Irishmen should stand, for "Ireland a Nation," and we hope those gentlemen will long be spared to see their dearest wish fulfilled. Attention was directed to the great necessity for a National army, the hope of every honest labourer worthy to be called a man, and who are in every village in Enfield, not alone organised, but can already group five out of six with an up to date England. These labourers ask only to be provided with the means by which they can live in Ireland, and thereby become the nucleus of our National defence. An empty sick cannot stand, neither can a hungry volunteer. The labourers are not begging; they demand their natural right of employment for willing workers, and we expect that our statesmen to be shall provide the means before it is too late—not promises, as John Bull gives. Be practical, as Irish statesmen Bull gives. Be practical, as Irish statesmen should be. For example, here in Mungret, a thickly populated district, eight or nine labourers, some of them having large families, altogether numbering about 36 persons, were employed almost constantly under the direct labour scheme by the Limerick County Council quarrying, breaking and carting stones for repair of roads, receiving 3s per yard. The same stone was used when the roads were making, and is being used for the past fifty years, and has passed surveyors and engineers during that time as first-class material. A short time ago a deputation of the I L & L A waited. on the County Council and asked for an increase of 6d yer yard, and put us on a level with other districts who are receiving 3s 6d and 4s per yard. We get a promise of an increase, but we did not yet receive it. Now there are stones dumped on us from another district and cost about £1 5s per yard, a serious matter for local ratepayers, and depriving us of the only means of existence we have.' Such an outrage should not be tolerated, and we call on those responsible to stop it. We also call on the L L. and L. A., locally and otherwise, to aid us in removing this glaring injustice which is being perpetrated on the Nationalist labourers and Volunteers of Mungret.-
