O'Halloran proposed Mr Michael Tobin, Michael Hannon seconded. James Keane proposed Mr James Crowe, and Mr C Hayes seconded. The election of Mr Michael Carmody was seconded by Mr Crowe, and seconded by Mr J Ryan; and the election of Mr Joseph was proposed by Mr C Hayes, and seconded by A Brennan.

All was then taken, when there voted—For 15; Lenihan, 12; O'Brien, 11; Carroll, Dwyer, 9; Ryan, 8; Tobin and Crowe, 4 and Conway, 3. On way fell out, and in the second poll Mr fell out. In the third poll Keane received 15; O'Brien, 12; O'Dwyer, 11; Carroll, Ryan, 10; Lenihan, 11; and Crowe, 9. Crowe fell out, and a fourth poll was taken, there voted—For Keane, 17; Lenihan, and Carroll, 11 each; O'Dwyer, 12; and Ryan, 10. Mr O'Brien then fell out.

The fifth poll the result was—Keane, 18; Ryan, 14 each; O'Dwyer, 13; and Carroll, 12. Mr Carroll then fell out. RE-ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.
