Peculiar Clare Case

CONFLICTING TESTIMONY

At the Ennis Quarter Sessions, his Honor County Court Judge Bodkin, E.C., heard an action for £6 15s, the price of a yearling heifer brought by Michael Scautan, Loop Head, against James Crawford, Letterkelly, Mr A Corbett, B L (instructed by Mr J B Lynch, solicitor), appeared for the plaintiff. Mr R H Cuillnan, B L (instructed by Mr John Cullinan, solicitor), appeared for the defendant.

The plaintiff deposed that he sold a belfer to the defendant st. Kilkee fair on the 16th May for 20 15s; after the sale he (witness) went buying a springer, and left a man named Han-rahan in charge of the helfer; in his absence the defendant came and took away the helfer, and when witness searched for him subsequently he could not find him; he did not know the defendant's name at the time or where he lived; in a few days he got a letter from the defeadant saying the helfer was in calf, and thar she was no good to him; witness had not been paid for her and he wrote back saying to send her home to him; the defendant did not do so, and witness, as a result of further correspondence went to the defendant's place and saw that the heifer had slung a calf ; he gave the defendant's father £1 compensa-

Amongst other questions, Mr. Cullinan asked-Are you aware that the defendant is prepared to swear that he paid you the 26 15s is a five pound note, a single note, and los in the presence of witnesses ? I don't know,

Were you drunk! No, but I had a few bottles of stout taken.

Did you tell old Crawford that you were drunk that night and that you did not know what happened to you ? No.

Did you ever say to anyone you were pald for the helfer ! No.

His Honor-Did you expect the man in whose charge you left the helfer to keep it until he got paid ! I never saw an occasion where a man did the like of this before; I though the payment would be all right.

Michael Hanrahan, Loop Head, said he was

in charge of the heifer when the defendant came to take it; he asked him not to take the animal until he paid for it, and he asked him for the money; he told witness it would be all right, and he took the animal away.

His Honor-Why did you let the animal go ?

I trusted the man (laughter). In reply to Mr. Cullinan, witness said he had

no drink taken that day. James Crawford, defendant, deposed he paid the plaintiff for the helfer in Keane's publichouse; Thomas Haugh was present and he counted the money into Haugh's hand, who passed it on to plaintiff; there were a few words about the "luck penny"; the plaintiff only wanted to give witness is, but Haugh
