Feely next took a "free" for Limerick, and placed the ball at the bar. O'Meara again saved, and his marvellous defence was loudly applauded. Both sides were now working with earnestness and determination, sheer stamina and accuracy in striking placing Limerick in a favourable position. O'Donnell again put his forwards attacking. Tipperary were on the defensive, and their defence could not be better. A free brought them much-needed relief, and Brolan getting possession found the net for Tipperary. Encouraged by this the "Tops" swooped down on the Limerick posts but Hayes, Vaughan and O'Shea were on the alert. For every rush made on them they retaliated with renewed energy, and amidst deafening cheers they effected a clearance. Feely, "Tyler," Tracey, M. Hayes and O'Donnell were now conspicuous for Limerick, and they kept up a fast pace, and indulged in some splendid combination movements as to completely out-maneuvre the Tipperary men. Gleeson, Carroll, and Harrington, in the forward line were making strenuous attempts to score, and their doggedness, determination, and splendid tackling were rewarded by having twice in succession found the net, one of the goals being mainly due to a fine shot delivered by Feely. "Tyler" Mackey worked very hard throughout. Before the half-time whistle went Tipperary scored a point. At half-time the score stood:—

Limerick—3 goals,
Tipperary—1 goal 1 point.

On resuming, Tipperary made headway, and after repeated attacks, which were cleverly averted by the Limerick backs, Brolan got possession and directed to Walsh, who found the net for a goal. This put Limerick on the alert. "Tyler" made some great rushes and placed his forwards attacking, and Harrington sending nicely to Carroll the latter scored a goal. The Limerick men again pressed, but though they worked hard to score they did not succeed in doing so. Tipperary were working very hard to gain the odds but M. Hayes, Tracey, Clancy and Keane worked as if for their very lives. Buoyed on by the shouts of their supporters Limerick worked harder than ever. Feely, Tyler and Hayes were responsible for several other scores. Within the last five minutes a memorable passing bout was witnessed. Martin Hayes lifted, and struck to Feely who met it in the air and directed to Gleeson the latter striking again without letting the ball touch the ground to Harrington who "snapped" the leather and sent in for a grand goal. Limerick were the masters of the situation, and they kept up the lead until the final whistle, when the score was:—
