Runaway Pony Killed

An accident of a somewhat unusual nature
 took place in William-street, Listowel, between
 twelve and one o'clock on Monday, when as
 the result of coming in contact with the shaft
 of a car, a pony was almost immediately killed.
 It appears the son of the owner of the pony,
 Mrs Colbert, of Athea, County Limerick, was
 about feeding it in the market, and after tak-
 ing off the blinkers for that purpose, the pony
 got frightened by the sudden barking of a dog,
 took head, ran out into Market-street, dashed

ATTITUDE OF THE LANDLORDS

 should be deleted—a condition to which the
