

## FURTHER STATEMENT BY THE DEPARTMENT

The Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction last night issued the following statement:—The animals (eight cattle and five swine) on the place at Clonakenny, Roscrea, where the disease appeared on 17th instant, were all slaughtered next day. It is hoped that the outbreak may prove an isolated one. The Department are in communication with the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries respecting this outbreak. Meanwhile the position in relation to the ports remains unchanged. As regards County Cork, the fact that that neighbourhood has been free from any further outbreak for almost seven weeks now has admitted of the local restrictions being relaxed from to-day (Monday) as follows:—(1) The Cork scheduled district has been contracted so as to extend for only three miles approximately around the places where the two latest outbreaks occurred. Movements of ruminants or swine out of, into, or on a road within this contracted district remain prohibited. (2) The previous more extended boundary of the scheduled district has now become the boundary of a prohibited area surrounding the contracted district. There will be no restriction on movements of ruminant animals or swine within this area, and fairs and markets within it will consequently be allowable, but movement of such stock out of the area, or from the area into, or into the area from, the inner contracted district will still be forbidden. (3) The yet wider boundary line that ran from Youghal via Clonmel, Caher, Tipperary, Limerick Junction, Herbertstown, and Kanturk round to Kinsale, and across which movements outwards were forbidden, has been abolished, and restrictions in relation to this line no longer apply. (4) The Kildorrery (Sales of Horses) Order and the Herbertstown (Sales of Animals) Order have been revoked.

Clerk—They have refused again.

Mr. Martin, Assistant Clerk—About the fifth time.

An endorsement was made asking would the Local Government Board please say when the Guardians may expect them to have sufficient information to settle the question.

Mr. Bermingham—I would ask was their regret genuine?

Chairman—It is, because they are afraid to chew their own chewed cabbage.

There were four applications for the position of van driver and ploughman—Patrick Liston, at 16s a week; Patrick Toomey, 17s; Thomas Earls, 15s, and Philip Sullivan, 20s.

Mr. Carroll said he knew Toomey, and had experience of what he was able to do as a workman, and he regarded him as most suitable for the position, and would propose him.

Mr. O'Donnell seconded. He had known Toomey for a considerable number of years, and always found him upright and steady, and he was sure he would attend to his duties if elected.

Chairman—Any other proposition?

Mr. Bennett—in the face of the tenders it would be very difficult to propose anyone else when we have got such a character of Toomey. There is another candidate I would like to propose, but I am afraid his tender is too high.

Toomey was elected, and called before the meeting when his duties were explained to him.

The other business was routine.

cently inspected the rights and reasons under the jurisdiction of the Harbour Board, and found them in good order.

A letter was read from Messrs. P. S. Connolly and Co., on behalf the Limerick Steamship Co., claiming £90 ascertained damage and loss, and £6 15s 6d dock dues paid in respect of a cargo of 300 tons of timber. The Steamship Co. were deprived of a berth for loading this cargo owing to the action of the Harbour Master in refusing to give them a berth to load the timber as arranged and agreed upon with him. Unless the claim was met within a reasonable time proceedings would be taken against the Board.

Mr. Morley explained the circumstances which had reference to the company's claim. In consequence of the ss. Adare not getting a berth she had to leave port under ballast. However, the vessel got a cargo at Fenit, and that reduced the claim against the Commissioners to £6 15s 6d dock dues.

Mayor—You are wiping out the £90 claim?

Mr. Morley—Yes.

On the motion of Mr. Goodbody, the claim was referred to the Law Committee.

The Engineer submitted a report relative to the claim of Diver M'Conkey for overtime in respect of work done to the Dock gates.

The Mayor thought that the claim should be paid.

The Engineer having explained the duties which the diver had to perform,

Mr. Goodbody said if a man was going to hair-splitting with the Board then the Board ought to hair-split with him.

Mr. Roche—What is the amount of the claim?

Engineer—Only a shilling.

The matter was referred to the Engineer to deal with.

Mr. Mcronev said he had inquired, as instructed, into the question of the Board generating their own electricity for the lighting of the docks and quays. The capital expenditure he estimated at £2,126 with an annual expenditure of £518.

Mayor—The best thing to do with the report is to mark it read. You know that the upkeep of the lamps has nothing to do with the price of current.

The Engineer remarked that if there was an increase in the price of current it was not fair to apply it to the cost of upkeep.

Mr. Cleeve—What is the price of current per unit—a penny or a penny halfpenny?

Mayor—Some people make it for less.

The Engineer said it was not per unit they were paying for the current, but by the price per lamp. They were charged by the Corporation so much per lamp, inclusive of maintenance and the original outlay on capital.

Mr. Cleeve—There must be some mistake by the Lighting Committee. They could not put on 20 per cent.

Mr. Griffin said the charge for current was increased.

The Secretary suggested that inquiry be made at the Power Station as to the quantity of current consumed for the lighting of the docks and quays.

Mr. Goodbody—Can you do that?

Secretary—Yes.

Mr. Griffin—But then you will have the maintenance and upkeep of lamps to consider.

Secretary—That is all in your contract.

Mr. Goodbody proposed that the Engineer have an interview with the Borough Electrical Engineer with a view to ascertaining the quantity of current used by the Board.

This was agreed to, and the matter was adjourned.
