and foot national troops, he has offered every possible convenience, and even that he will place his own personal knowledge and experience at the disposal of the local corps or any national corps in the country. On the advice of Mr. Cullinan, M.P., to whom the offer was made, Mr. John Redmond, leader of the Irish Party, has accepted the spirited generosity of Colonel Massy."

The Press report having been handed round to the members, and perused by them, Mr. Denis Quinlan said—"My soul, I never doubted you; he would be, of course, like the great General 'Redan' Massy."

The Chairman said he proposed that the thanks of the people—and they were genuine thanks—should naturally go forth to Colonel Massy from that body, which was in every way representative of the people. It was a kindly, patriotic offer from the brother of the great General Dunham Massy, who had been one of the Chairmen of the Board, and long and prominently connected with it, and who had such a long and distinguished connection with the profession of arms. Colonel Massy, like his brother of the Redan fame, whose gallantry and bravery in the Crimean War was so historic, had decided to cast his lot in with the cause of his country, and devote his splendid energies and abilities to Ireland and the National Volunteers. That Board would be the first to offer him their compliments on behalf of the Irish Volunteers, of which they were all members, and to congratulate him on his patriotic actions and what he had done towards securing the future liberty of Ireland a nation (applause). He (Chairman) proposed that the best thanks of the Board and those of all Irishmen be conveyed to Colonel Massy for his generous and gallant offer, and he would leave it to older members of the Board who had been associated with the late General Massy to speak to the resolution.

Mr. Denis Quinlan (Cullen) in seconding the resolution, said he had been fortunate enough to have personal associations with the late General Massy, and found him deserving of the greatest admiration. Speaking as an Irishman, he was sure that the Volunteer movement was necessary, and would effect good for the country, and once they were armed, very little would be heard of the Ulster malcontents (hear, hear). Everyone should thank Colonel Massy for his gallant act in coming to the rescue of our country from bondage, and Colonel Massy with his colleagues would be successful in the great feat to which they had set their brains and strength, the work of making Ireland a nation once again (applause).

Chairman—It is our honest hope that others will follow in their footsteps (hear, hear).

Mr. Fitzgerald said there was certainly no one more worthy of appreciation than the renowned General Massy, whose brother was a fine successor to a great soldier.

Chairman—I have seen grand companies of the National Volunteers at drill in those grounds every evening.

The Clerk said there was no doubt that no tribute of praise could be paid to General Massy or his brother that they did not deserve.

The Chairman said he thought if the late General Massy was still alive, his sympathies and action would be the same as his brother's.

The Board decided on behalf of the people to convey thanks to Colonel Massy for his action.

Limerick Farmer's Death
