ALLEGED RETENTION OF PROPERTY.

It was heard last Court day, when it was found on the ground that the Court had no jurisdiction as the value of the property was over £5.

Complainant now brought separate summonses against each watch.

The evidence was given, Mr. Moran contending that the magistrates had no jurisdiction to hear the charges.

The value of the watches was £5. Now to bring himself within the jurisdiction of the Court he brought summonses against each watch.

Kenny held that a separate penalty could be imposed for the retention of each watch.

Kelly said that the statute did not show an unlawful retention of the watches could be claimed for, but he would hear the complainant's testimony.

Complainant's testimony was to the effect that on the 28th February last he gave the defendant four watches to repair, and which were returned. The value of the property he claimed at £4.

In reply to Mr Moran, the defendant denied the charges on the last day that he had received all the watches given for repair.

Mary J Whittaker deposed to asking the defendant to return the property, and he promised to do so.

Kelly said the case was dismissed last day on the ground that the magistrates had no jurisdiction.

The evidence tendered then had been repeated, with the exception that complainant testified that he had made a mistake in valuing the watches.

However, he was still satisfied that the case was only one, and it would be dismissed without prejudice.

Moran applied for costs, and 10s were ordered.

MAKING AMENDS.

The adjourned case of cruelty to his wife was heard against Charles Whelan, carpenter, lastings, Solicitor for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children stated that since last Court day the defendant had contributed towards the maintenance of his children, and was living with them.

It was ed that the charge be adjourned for months.

Each consented to the application.

A BAD CASE.

A youth type of individual named Michael Kelly was prosecuted by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children for child neglect and ill-treatment.

Hastings, solicitor, represented the defendant and in her evidence Mary Walsh, wife of the defendant, stated that since her marriage, some months ago, her husband had been cruel to her.

Within the past month he had beaten her and had two children. She was in constant dread of him, and in addition to his acts of cruelty he contributed scarcely anything to her maintenance.
