After the evidence had been fully gone into, Mr De Renzy in summing up gave his decision in favour of Thomas Collins, who will have to pay costs.

Mr T. Kelly, Clerk of the Union, was allowed 14 guineas expenses, and Mr Galvin, Returning Officer, 10 guineas. There were 3 guineas extra costs for the posting of the notices.

DEATH OF MR. JAMES O'NEILL.

The death took place a few days since of Mr James O'Neill, who for the past ten years was engaged in the mantle department, Messrs. John McBirney and Co, Limerick, where his many good qualities and unassuming character made him a general favourite. Deceased was quite a young man, only 28 years of age, and his demise occurred after a comparatively brief illness, and to the regret of his friends and acquaintances. The interment took place in the family burial-ground at Galbally. The chief mourners were—John O'Neill and Patrick O'Neill (brothers), Anne O'Neill (sister), Eddie O'Neill (nephew), Mrs O'Neill (sister-in-law), and other relatives. The Limerick Drapers' Club, the Irish Drapers' Assistants' Benefit and Protection Association, and the staff of McBirney and Co. were represented at the funeral, which was a large one.
