Thomas Madden, postman from Caher to

to John Boland; witness on the same occasion
gave accused a letter addressed to Thomas
Corry, senr.

Mr. John Hill-Shinner, an officer in the In-
vestigation Branch of the Secretary's Office,
General Post Office, Dublin, deposed that he
conducted the inquiry in the present case: on
the 4th inst., witness made up for post two
letters, both in covers, bearing the name of
Kerin and Hickman, solicitors, Ennis; one
was a registered letter addressed to
Mr. John Boland, Derryfadda, Dromindoor,
Feake, County Clare (produced), and the other
unregistered was addressed to Mr. Thomas
Corry, senr., Derryfadda, Dromindoor,
Feake, Co. Clare; he posted those on the
evening of the 4th inst; on the following day
at Derryfadda witness had an interview with
the accused, telling him he had come to make
inquiries about letters addressed to Mr. John
Boland; after being cautioned, and in presence
of Sergeant Oates accused made a statement ad-
mitting that he wrote two letters in Boland's
name to Mr. Toohy for money and he got two
sums of £5; he also received in Mr. Corry's
name the sum of £14; Thomas Corry did not
authorise him to write it; witness continuing,
said he went along with O'Neill to see him de-
liver letters which he had not delivered;
O'Neill made an excuse to leave witness,
going on the road some forty yards
in front; accused then started to run
witness calling after him; he had not seen
accused since, until to-day; on the following
day witness made an information for the
arrest of prisoner who was not taken into
custody until some ten days later.

Evidence of arrest was given by Sergeant
Hogarty, Tubber, after which,
Mr. Bate applied to his worship to return
the prisoner for trial at the Winter Assizes.
Mr. Kelly granted the application, returning
the accused in custody.

Limerick Corporation And The Pope's Death

At the usual weekly meeting of the Limerick
Corporation Committees on Wednesday night,
the Mayor presiding, a resolution was adopted
regretting the loss sustained by the Catholic
World by the death of His Holiness Pope Pius
X, and a copy to be forwarded to his lordship
the Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer.

The following is the text of the resolution
which was proposed by Councillor Johnson and
seconded by Councillor Donnellan:—“That
we, the members of the County Borough
Council of Limerick, assembled in Committee
on the 26th August, 1914, take the earliest
opportunity of placing on record our heartfelt
regret and sympathy with his Lordship the
Bishop, as head of the diocese and the Church
in general, on the loss that they have sus-
tained by the death of His Holiness,
the late Pope Pius X, which sad
event cast a gloom of sadness throughout the
Catholic world, at such a critical time for
Europe, when his wise counsel and guiding
hand were needed to try and restore to Europe
that peace which she had enjoyed during his
illustrious Pontificate. Pius X will long live in
the memory throughout the succeeding ages,
of his faithful Irish people, as a
worthy successor to his Holiness, the
late Pope Leo XIII. for his works of charity
and kindness, and for the love which he always
expressed he had for the Irish people. That
this Corporation do now adjourn as a mark of
respect, and in order to share the universal
sorrow to one whose saintly life and able
guidance have endeared him to all his children
throughout Christendom. That copies of this
resolution be sent to his Lordship the Bishop
and the heads of the Church.”

Winter Cropping in Co. Limerick

From intercourse with farmers in West
Limerick and East Kerry, writes our Abbey-
feale correspondent, there are indications in
many districts of efforts being made to increase
winter cropping. Rye winter oats and hardy
green crops will engage most attention. It is
regrettable that wheat has been sown only in
isolated patches where formerly it was more
extensively cultivated. It is expected the
County Committee of Agricultural Instruction
will arrange for short lectures on winter
cropping immediately throughout the County
Limerick.

SUPPLIES FROM ABROAD

A cargo of 15,000 quarters of wheat and 3,000
quarters of oats reached Hull yesterday from
Montreal. Large quantities of fruit and veget-
ables also arrived from Rotterdam.
