## CITY TRAGEDY

#### YOUNG MAN DROWNED

#### Sad Occurrence at Park Bridge

BODY OF DECEASED FOUND TO DAY

A painful tragedy occurred in the city on Monday night when a young man of the small farmer class named Stephen Keane, a native of Park, near Limerick, jost his life by drowning in the Abbey river. It appears that the deceased, who was an unmarried man of about 30 years of age, had been resting on the parapet of Park Bridge when he slipped off and fell into the water, a considerable distance beneath. Someone who happened to be fishing near the place at the time heard the splash and raised an alarm, whereupon a young man named Timothy Carroll, with considerable bravery, jumped in to rescue the drowning man. Keane, however, had unfortunately gone beneath the surface of the water, and in consequence Carroll's plucky and praiseworthy attempt, which deserves due recognition, proved unavailing. The river was dragged yesterday, but without avail, as it was not until between eleven and twelve o'clock to-day the body was discovered opposite the Sand Mail, about midway between Park Bridge and Matthew Bridge.

These were great words, and could only emanate from a great man. He (Mr. Mackey) was sure the Board would not hesitate to adjourn as a mark of respect to the memory of the late Pope. Other public bodies in the city and county had taken similar action, and he suggested that the cierk forward a copy of the resolution to the Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer and Most Rev. Dr. Fogarty, Bishops of Limerick and Killaloe, respectively.

The Chairman said, as a Protestant, he was very glad to second Mr. Mackey's resolution, more especially as the Pope's death was a sad ending to a useful life. The late Pope died of grief because he could do nothing to stop the terrible European war. Most Protestants recognise that the Pope was a very liberal minded man, and he had pointed out many facts never stated before, for each religion and the duty of one towards the other,
