contractors at the present juncture in keeping their stock up to the normal stan-dard owing to the fact that many of the drugs are obtained from abroad, and the manufacturers' stock of dressings have been depleted by the requirements of the military authorities. Contractors have been authorised to reduce the demands for any of these articles where they will find it impossible to supply the full amount ordered, having regard to their obligations to other unions. A "DRY" STATE

LAW AGAINST INTOXICANTS For the first time in its history, says Every-

body's Monthly, West Virginia has become what is called a "dry" State, beginning this month. By virtue of the 92,000 majority for Prohibition at the poll in November, 1912, the legal sale of liquor has ceased in this State, and brewery, distillery, and saloon property, valued at £12,000,000, is worthless to day. The law against the selling of intoxicants is most stringent. To give away liquor or to sell it means a gaol sentence and fine for the first offence. Imprisonment for five years may be given a second offence. All patent medicines containing more than one-half (5) per cent. of alcohol are classed as intoxicants. Advertisements of liquors are barred from newspapers. It is unlawful to distribute advertising pertaining to intoxicants of any character. Saloonkeepers, distillers and brewers who permit liquor to remain in their establishments after the coming into effect of the law are deemed as violating the law, and State officials are now reported to be conducting a rigidsearch in all such places.

GAEL'S DEATH CLARE

Deep regret has been caused, not alone in his native parish, but in the districts for miles around, by the passing away rather unexpectedly, in early manhood, of Mr. John Hayes, Hurlers' Cross, Sixmilebridge. The deceased, who was a well-known and popular Gael, was a general favourite, his amiability and courtesy having endeared him to all.
