**CROOM DISTRICT COUNCIL.**

**Half-yearly Meeting.**

Mr John Coleman, J.P., Co.C. (Chairman), presided at the half-yearly meeting of the Croom District Council on Thursday. The names of the other members present will be found in the report of the Guardians in another column.

Messrs James Conway, Clerk; T E Ryan, County Surveyor, and M Irwin, Deputy Surveyor, were the officials present.

Mr Conway read the report of the County Surveyor, Western Division, as follows:—Since taking up office I have been over most of the roads, and visited the principal quarries in your district. The roads are at present in a very good condition after the favourable summer we have had. The getting out of the supplies for the coming autumn and winter is now well in hand, but in some cases the material will not be out as early as I should wish owing to the difficulty of getting hand breakers. However, with the help of the new stone breaker, which is at present on order for the Western Division, I hope to be able to arrange the work in future so that all the necessary material will be delivered in depots on the roads during the summer months. On taking up office I found that on the balance left for main roads in your district for the twelve months ending 31st March, 1915, there was a deficit of £674 on the annual presentment. It will be necessary for me to get a supplementary grant of this amount to enable me to maintain the roads during the coming autumn and winter. Steam rolling—The portion of the road from Limerick to Bruff in your district has been passed for steam rolling, and the Roads Board grant has been obtained towards the cost of same. The material is at present being got out for the work and I hope to have the rolling started in the near future. Road Estimates—I have gone very carefully into the question of the estimates for road expenditure and find that my estimate for 12 months ending 31st March, 1914, is £4,181, leviable off your district, which includes the amount to be levied in respect of main roads. This shows an increase of £231 on the estimate for last year, which is due to the increase of wages during the past 12 months, amounting to 16 per cent, viz., from 12s to 14s per week. Notices of motion—I have received no list of above, and I take it there are none. I have no official list of recommendations to lay before you. General—With reference to the general management and working of the roads in your district in future, there are a few points which I should like to bring under the notice of the Council with a view to securing the co-operation and help of the members. The first is with reference to the cutting of hedges; it is practically impossible to maintain roads in any kind of good condition which are shut out from the effects of the sun and air by high bushes growing along the sides. I regret to say that in many parts of your district this condition of things prevails, and I intend next October to issue notices to all owners of adjoining property to cut their bushes, and if necessary, get an order of the Court to compel them to do so. The other matter is with reference to quarries. In some parts of the district where materials are scarce the owners of quarries refuse to allow them to be used for county purposes. It will be necessary for me in such cases to get an order of Court and enter such quarries. I should like to impress on the Council that any extreme steps which are taken in these, as in all other matters affecting the working of the roads, are taken in the best interests of the Council and the rate-payers as a whole.—Your obedient servant, "T E RYAN, Co Surveyor W.D."

The Clerk said the County Surveyor's estimate to the 31st March, 1915, was £3,731. The Council passed £3,108 19s. The County Surveyor's estimate to the 31st March, 1916, was £4,181, and taking the amount passed by the Council for March, 1915, £3,108 19s, from the County Surveyor's estimate, £4,181, it would show an increase of £1,072 1s, which, when £874 supplementary grant applied for was added, would make a gross increase of £1,746 1s over the amount passed by the Council last year.

The Chairman said the amount asked for by the County Surveyor in the past two terms was £600 in excess of the amount struck by the Council. The figures as given by the Clerk did not exactly represent the facts. The estimate demanded £3,700, but the Council left a deficit of £600. The increase was between £3,700, which was the County Surveyor's estimate, and £4,181, and that represented the increase proper—£40. That portion of the increase was accounted for by the fact that an increase of wages had been passed by the County Council for the labourers on the roads. Mr Ryan said the increase he put down did not represent the actual increase passed.

The Chairman said it was plain they looked the previous estimates by £600. They had been striving to keep the amounts as low as they could. It had been stated that they had been sparing on the working of the roads, but they had been increasing the amount instead of decreasing it. They often assigned reasons for these things, but he was quite certain that with the present two County Surveyors that matters would improve, and that the actual expenditure would be limited. In Mr Ryan, the County Surveyor for that division, they could be assured of his giving entire satisfaction.

**FUNERAL OF MR. WM. CHRISTY.**

The remains of the late Mr William Stanley Christy, who passed away on Tuesday night at the great age of 93 years, were removed from his late residence, 58 George-street, yesterday morning at 10 o'clock to the Methodist Church, where the service was held, and at the conclusion of which the funeral left for the family burial place at St Munchin's. The cortege, which was very numerous, embraced all classes and creeds, and bore ample testimony to the esteem in which the late Mr Christy was held, and the sympathy which is expressed with his family in their bereavement. The Service was conducted in the Church by the Rev H. Shier, Adare, Chairman of Limerick District; Rev C. S. Greaves, Limerick, and Rev B. E. Gentleman, Dublin.

The service in the church was opened with the singing of the hymn "Thy way, not mine, O Lord." Rev. Mr Shier offered up prayer, after which Rev. Mr Greaves read the portion of Scripture appointed for the burial service. The Rev. Mr Gentleman, who for some years was Minister of the Methodist Church in Limerick, and a close friend of the deceased, delivered a very touching tribute to his memory. He said they mourned the loss of one of their oldest fellow-citizens; one who was recognised by all who knew him as an upright, kind-hearted, courteous Christian gentleman, an industrious and successful man of business, a considerate employer of labour, and better than all a sincere and humble follower of the Lord Jesus Christ. Sorrow was sometimes brought to an irreducible minimum, and he ventured to say that the passing of William Christy was such. It was not like a sheaf of corn blasted in the ear, but rather like the fully ripened sheaf into which the kindly husbandman put his sickle to gather it home to the garner. In that place of worship their friend was a constant attendant, never absent from his place on the Lord's day, or at the week-day services, and even down to last Sunday morning he was with them in that church. All the offices that could possibly fall to him in connection with church affairs were entrusted to him. For forty years continuously he occupied the position of Circuit Steward with great benefit and advantage to the congregation, and with great kindness to the various ministers, to whom he extended a hearty welcome on their coming here to occupy a temporary home amongst them. The rev gentleman spoke of Mr Christy's deep religious character, and he remarked that his rich tenor voice had been frequently heard in St Mary's Cathedral whose noble service he admired so much. Dwelling on his home life, Mr. Gentleman observed that the deceased was privileged to see his children grow up to manhood and womanhood, and take their places in the battle of life, and he also spoke of his citizenship, and the important place he filled in the life of the community. His family would never forget that the last words he uttered before he retired to his eternal rest were "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ, neither life nor death." And with these words on his lips he fell asleep in Jesus.

The Service closed with the favourite hymn of the deceased "Abide With Me." The funeral then left for St Munchin's, where the closing portion of the Service was conducted by Rev Mr Greaves and Canon Robertson.

The blinds of the Protestant Young Men's Association were drawn, and the Institution closed during the funeral. The coffin was borne from the house to the Church and thence to the hearse by employees of the deceased. The pulpit and platform in the Church were draped in black. The business houses along the route to St. Munchin's were shuttered or had their blinds drawn.
