

forces, to carry on and bring to a successful issue the mighty conflict in which we are engaged." Our military preparations are progressing most satisfactorily. There are now on the field more than six divisions of British troops and two cavalry divisions. There is a steady flow of reinforcements to the front, picked troops are coming from India, and other British possessions, while "In response to the call for recruits for the new armies, which it is considered necessary to raise, we have had a most remarkable demonstration of the energy and enthusiasm of the young men in this country." Having said so much, Lord Kitchener goes on to express the hope that the problem of supplying officers for the new armies will be solved by the large numbers coming forward to fill vacancies, and also by promotion from the non-commissioned officers ranks of the regular forces. Reviewing the general situation his Lordship says he is confident that by the spring we shall have ready to take the field well trained armies which will prove themselves formidable opponents to the enemy. The Government, he says in conclusion, "fully recognise the fine spirit which animates those who have come forward to fight for their country, and will spare no effort to secure that everything is done that can be done to enable them worthily to contribute to the ultimate success of our arms." An assurance such as this is bound to have a stimulating and an enthusiastic effect upon all to whom it is addressed.

DEATH OF MR THOMAS LANE, D.C.

We regret to record the death of Mr Thomas Lane, D.C., which took place, from pneumonia, at his residence Rivers, Lisnagry, yesterday in his 63th year. For very many years and down to the time of his death, Mr Lane was a member of the Limerick Board of Guardians, and was highly esteemed by his colleagues and the general public for his independence and honesty of purpose, as well as for his kindly and genial manner.
