ABBEYFEALE WATER AND SANITARY CONDITIONS

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

At a meeting of the W. N. H. A., held at the Courthouse, Abbeyfeale, Mr. Jeremiah M. Carthy presided. Mrs. Bibian Foran, Chief Organiser; Mrs. P. Broderick, Hon. Sec.; Miss K. Cotter, Hon. Treasurer; and Mr. P. Broderick, secretary, were also present.

Mrs. Broderick having explained how other matters in connection with the branch progressed, referred to the present state of the water supply and the sanitary condition of the town.

Mrs. Foran—Is there not a sufficiency of water?

Chairman—There is one day's supply at any time, but in dry weather there can be none, owing to the absence of any reservoir sufficiently ample to retain it.

Mrs. Foran—Is there no provision made against fire, or any epidemic that may arise?

Chairman—None.

Mrs. Foran—That is a very serious matter for the people of Abbeyfeale, and also for those responsible for it. It was certainly an extraordinary state of affairs for a town like Abbeyfeale.

Chairman—It was necessary to construct a reservoir capable of holding at least 100 days' supply. There is as much water flowing uselessly away every day as would supply three towns if any effort were made to conserve it.

After further discussion the following resolution was unanimously adopted—"That we again urge on the Sanitary Authority the great danger that daily menaces the lives of the people of Abbeyfeale owing to their negligence in providing a proper reservoir to conserve a water supply for the town. That we also urge on them the danger that also exists from the delay in executing the sewerage scheme already approved of. That the Sanitary Authority will be held responsible for the results of their negligence, and after an expression of public opinion we shall seek to put the 15th Section of the Public Health Act, 1896, into operation against them."
