IN DISTRICT SCHOOL.

BEEF WANTED.
The Board of Management of the above School, at their meeting to be held at Glin, on 1st September, 1914, receive and consider applications for supplying the School with Best Heifer or Ox Beef from 30th September to 31st March, 1915. Each head of beef to be submitted to the Master for inspection at 9 o'clock a.m., and must be slaughtered by 10 o'clock a.m. Any beast to be removed from the premises forthwith must not be less than 3 cwt more than 5 cwt weight uncut, having a good ped of fat, free from offal and skirting, vertebrae joint, and hind and fore legs. All the offal, skin, blood, etc., must be removed from the premises by the contractor from the School premises by the contractor after killing. Tenders must separately state the price to be paid for the beef or ox beef. It will be optional with the contractor to accept either heifer or ox, or any other beast deemed advisable. A sum of £5 will be lodged with the Clerk by each person tendering to prove that the tender is genuine to be returned in case contract is declared and bond not returned within 14 days after declaration of contract, containing names of two solvent sureties to guarantee performance of the contract, must be returned not later than 12 o'clock noon on the named day, and marked on the outside "Tender for Beef." The lowest or any tender may be accepted.—By order,

THE Department of Agriculture and Instruction for Ireland desire to draw attention to the obligation which, in pursuance of the above Order, now rests on persons owning or having charge of Sheep in Ireland, to cause all such animals, excepting those exempted under the Order, to be dipped in each year between the 1st day of JUNE and the 31st day of JULY, both dates inclusive (the "Summer Dipping Period") and between the 1st day of AUGUST and the 15th day of NOV., both dates inclusive (the "Autumn Dipping Period"), by thorough immersion in a Sheep Dip approved by the Department for Sheep Scab. The only cases in which exemption from this requirement will be allowable are those indicated in the extracts from the Order which are given at the foot of this Notice. The following is a summary of some of the other provisions in the Order which should also be strictly observed:

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DIP.
For the purpose of enabling the Local Authority, if they so wish, to be represented at the dipping, written notice of the intention to dip, stating the time and place of intended dipping, the approximate number of sheep intended to be dipped, and the place where such sheep are located at time of forwarding of the notice must, moreover, be delivered or sent by the owner or person in charge of any sheep required to be dipped under the Order in that period, to the Sergeant of the Police for the Police Sub-District in which the sheep are located. The notice must, moreover, be received by the Local Police Sergeant five clear days at least before the intended time of dipping. If from any cause the dipping of the sheep on the date specified in a notice becomes impracticable, no further notice shall be required if the sheep are dipped as soon after such date as is practicable.

MOVEMENT TO MARKET DURING PARTS OF PRESCRIBED DIPPING PERIODS.
Between 1st July and 31st July, both dates inclusive, in each year, any Sheep sent for exposure for sale at a Market, Fair, or Sale Yard in Ireland, must be accompanied by a Declaration, signed by the owner of the Sheep or his authorised Agent, to the effect that the Sheep have been duly dipped under the Order since 31st May in that year. Between 1st September and 15th November, both dates inclusive, in each year, any Sheep sent for exposure for sale at a Market, Fair, or Sale Yard in Ireland, must be accompanied by a Declaration, signed by the owner of the Sheep or his authorised Agent, to the effect that the Sheep have been dipped under the Order since 31st July in that year, or by a Declaration, similarly signed, and countersigned by a member of the Police Force for the Police Sub-District from whence the Sheep have come, indicating that the Sheep have been dipped since 31st May, and have since such dipping been kept separate from sheep which were not so dipped.

CLIPPING BEFORE DIPPING IN SUMMER DIPPING PERIOD.
Sheep dipped under the Order in the Summer Dipping Period must have been clipped previously in the same year, but Lambs under nine months old are not required so to be clipped prior to the Summer dipping.
ISOLATION OF SHEEP AFTER EITHER DIPPING PERIOD.
All Sheep when dipped under either dipping period must be kept isolated from the remainder of that period isolated practicable from Sheep which have not been dipped.
