The Clerk read a letter from the L. G. Board  
 relating to the sugar contract, stating they  
 were not aware of any statute which would  
 obviate the present difficulty. At the end of  
 the contract they would be prepared to con-  
 sider any claim of the contractor in conse-  
 quence of the war.

In reply to Lady Emly,  
 The Clerk said sugar had gone up from 16s  
 3d to 36s per cwt. Soon after the outbreak of  
 the war it rose to 56s per cwt.

It was decided to send a copy of the L. G.  
 Board's letter to the contractor.

Rev. Brother Hayes was temporarily appoint-  
 ed Master of the Institution, an advertisement

A resolution was moved by Mr. Lawlor, and  
 seconded unanimously, regretting the death of  
 Mr. Thomas Lane, a former esteemed member  
 of the Board, and conveying to the members of  
 his family their condolence.

Mr. Power and the Clerk spoke in feeling  
 terms of Mr. Lane's association with the Board,  
 and recalled the celebrated sprinting contest  
 for the chair between deceased and the late Mr.  
 Kelly.

Mr. Drew proposed and spoke to a resolution  
 of regret on the death of Mrs. Enright, of Glin,  
 mother-in-law of their esteemed member, Mr.  
 Wm. Collins.

Mr. Collins thanked the Board for its sym-  
 pathy.

Messrs. Glynn and Sons, Kilmrush, were  
 declared contractors for best bakers' flour  
 (Irish milled) at £1 18s 9d per sack.

Mr. Thomas O'Donnell was declared con-  
 tractor for best maiden heifer beef a 5 19-20d  
 per lb. Mr. M'Donnell was declared contrac-  
 tor for mutton at 7d per lb.

Mr. Thomas M'Elligott tendered for stock-  
 taking for the half year at £3. Mr. Daniel  
 O'Connor tendered at 18s. After discussion,  
 Mr. O'Connor was appointed.

Mr. James Lawlor moved the following res-  
 olution, which was seconded by Mrs. M'Don-  
 nell—"That we, the members of the Board of  
 Management of the Glin District  
 School, representatives being present  
 from Limerick, Kilmallock, Listowel,  
 Croom, Newcastle West, and Rathkeale,  
 Poor Law Unions, tender to the leader of the  
 Irish people Mr. John E. Redmond, M.P., our  
 congratulations on the success of the Irish  
 Party's labours in winning for our country  
 Home Rule. We hereby offer to support him  
 now as before Home Rule was placed on the  
 Statute Book, and we have every confidence  
 the country will act on his advice as to the  
 patriotic and manly course to be taken at this  
 crisis, as our own and European liberty is im-  
 perilled."

Lady Emly supported the resolution, and said  
 Belgium was fighting Ireland's battle, and only  
 for their heroism in stemming the tide of the  
 German invasion these latter would now be in  
 Paris, and of course it would not be long be-  
 fore they who had been guilty of such atrocities  
 would do the same to our own people (hear,  
 hear). But when they are kept back by Irish-  
 men, Englishmen and Scotchmen at the front  
 we are safe (hear, hear).

Mr. Brennan dissented from the latter part  
 of the resolution. He would not be for fighting  
 for England. They knew what they got from  
 England in the past, and it was only very  
 lately they shot down people in Dublin. This  
 attitude was supported by Mr. Keane and  
 Mr. Drew.

Mr. John Power said he had been all his life  
 a Nationalist, and more, he was a Fenian, and  
 he wished to say now in the presence of the  
 Press he would back Mr. Redmond, and would  
 fight for England if he was required, and would  
 go to the front (cheers).

Mr. Nolan said he did not see why the res-  
 olution should not be adopted. Those who did  
 not want to fight could stay away.

A poll was taken, and the resolution was  
 carried, amidst cheers, by 11 votes to 4.

Mr. M. D. Conway did not vote.

On the motion of Mr. Lawlor it was agreed  
 to give the children of the School a day's holi-  
 day in honour of the granting of Home Rule.

backing, have increased representation in the  
 towns, and secure a fixed procedure for certain  
 classes of appointments, does not alter this  
 conviction of ours. No set of Irishmen is  
 less in need of any special safeguard whatso-  
 ever when the great political issue is settled;  
 and their way to a real conquest, well worth  
 having, is to join the rest of the country. Then,  
 our Unionist friends have also to look to the  
 Nationalist point of view. Nationalist Ireland  
 will go no further than she has already gone,  
 with so much heart-burning, on the lines of  
 voting out, and on no account will Ulster  
 Nationalists accept anything in the shape of  
 a special Administrative Council, which would  
 be sure to set up friction, and divide their  
 interests from the rest of Ireland. That is  
 the position as we understand it. Therefore,  
 in the friendliest spirit, we ask our Unionist  
 neighbours to review the situation both  
 in the light of their own abiding interests  
 and of the plain facts of the case on the  
 Nationalist side. We know not a particle of  
 difference in the prospect for Nationalists and  
 Unionists, Catholics and Protestants, under  
 the new Constitution, and meeting together on  
 the Feast of Saint Adamnan, who did so much  
 in his day for peace in the three countries, it  
 has occurred to us to do what little we can, in  
 these days of stress abroad, to promote lasting  
 peace at home.
