The Kilmallock Board of Mr. T. W. W. Bennett, recently Mr. W. Moloney, board transmitted the report of Mr. Cyril E. Browne, who reports that I have audited the Kilmallock Union for the month of March, 1914, and beg to certify copies of the report. The lists contain a number of cases in which the relief is as their opinion that it should properly be reduced. The relieving officers are not doing their duty and do not give adequate consideration of the circumstances of individual cases. I have to point out that relief should be obtained in all cases where it is needed for goods. The relieving officers having been provided with scales in use are not altered, and are not aware that a new scale should be prepared if this is not to be put in use. Properly certified copies of the receipts should be prepared.
