LIMERICK DISTRICT LUNATIC ASYLUM.
TO COAL MERCHANTS.
THE Committee of Management of the ab Asylum, at their meeting to be held Wednesday, 14th October, 1914, will consist of Tenders for supplying the Institution with tons Best Steam Coals. The coal must "through and through," and be supplied from some of the following collieries:—Lewesmerl Globe, Ocean, Merthyr, St. Helen's, Cumberlands, Nixon's Navigation, International, Ebbow, V William Pitts Allerdale, or Great Western Ste. The coal must be fresh wrought at the time shipment, and must be delivered (carriage free) direct from the ship to Asylum, and "certificate" and "bill of lading" to be furnished before delivery. The delivery to be continuing until complete, and not less than 100 tons a day, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. otherwise a penalty of £5 per day will be enforced. The coal must be supplied within fourteen days of acceptance of tender, and be weighed on Harbour Commissioners' lever before delivery. The contractor will be required to state name of collieries from which they intend supply. The printed form of tender to be obtained at the Storekeeper's Office up to 5 p.m. on Monday, 12th October, will only be received. Tender should be properly endorsed, "Steam Coal," and sent in not later than 10.30 o'clock a.m. on Tuesday, 13th October, 1914. Contractors will be required to execute a bond, and must attend the Clerk's Office, with their sureties, for purpose of signing same within ten days of declaration of the contract, otherwise the contract will be annulled. The Committee do not bind themselves to accept the lowest or any tender. N.B.—The coal to contain a percentage of large, which must be stated in the Colliery Certificate. No tender will be considered except marked "1914."
