## Newcastle West Quarter Sessions

### Malicious Injury Claims

#### APPLICATIONS BEFORE THE COUNTY COURT JUDGE

The Newcastle West Quarter Sessions were opened on Wednesday by his Honor County Court Judge Law-Smith. The business was of a very light character, consisting only of a number of undefended and defended civil bills. The Sessions were resumed and concluded yesterday, when a number of compensation claims for malicious injuries were disposed of.

Patrick J. Curtin, Kilfergus, Glin, claimed £9 compensation for the malicious destruction of an iron hay rick on the 21st June.

His Honor awarded £8, to be levied off Glin Rural District.

John Casey, Ballyluggane, Ardagh, applied for £40 compensation for the burning of a dwellinghouse and effects, his property, on the 1st July.

Having heard the evidence, the Court allowed £21, which was ordered to be levied off Newcastle West Rural District.

An application was made by the Irish Creamery Exporters' Association, Ltd, for £31 compensation for damage to the doors and fittings of Atria Creamery on the 6th September.

His Honor granted £30 15s, which he ordered to be charged to Newcastle West Rural District.

Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, solicitor, represented the County Council in these cases; Mr. E. Leahy, solicitor, was for the Newcastle West District Council, and Mr. T. F. Windle, solicitor, for Glin District Council.

At the Kilrush Quarter Sessions on Thursday, before Judge Bodkin, the following applicants were granted transfers for spirit licences:—Miss Crotty, The Square; Michael O'Corry, Francis-street, and Annie Corry, Kilkee. The magistrates associated with his Honor were—Messrs. M. S. Gibson, C Kelly, J. Kelly, J Griffin, and W Deherly.

#### VALUATION APPEALS

A number of valuation appeals from residents of Kilkee against the Valuation Office, were heard, and after evidence having being given, his Honor reduced the valuations.

#### INDECENT ASSAULT.

A farmer named Moloney, from the Knockerra district, appeared on bail to answer a charge of criminal assault on an old woman named Browne, from the same locality, last August.

Mr. F. F. Cullinan, C.S., applied to have the case adjourned to the next Assizes, as a fair and impartial trial could not be expected owing to the canvassing of jurors in the district.

His Honor adjourned the case to the next Assizes, and allowed the prisoner out on bail in £40 and two sureties of £20 each.

## Limerick Soldiers

#### REPORTED DEAD AT THE FRONT

It is reported that the deaths have occurred at the front of Francis Duggan, Royal Engineers, and Michael O'Shaughnessy, Irish Guards, both natives of Limerick.

His Honor—Was he using the stroke haul? Oh, yes. I want to be clear. He was not fishing in a legitimate way? Oh, no; I have been looking at it for the last seven years. Mr. Corbett, solicitor—Looking at "stroke hauling"? Oh, no, legitimate fishing.

Examination continued—When David Ives got the rod in the boat he got out a cast of flies and commenced to use it; witness said he would charge him with refusing to pull ashore; he then walked away and the boat continued on; he attributed the drawing in of the rod to the boat going towards where his son was.

By Mr. Corbett, solicitor—This was at 2 o'clock?

To his Honor—There was nothing to prevent them from coming in—it would only take a couple of seconds to come in.

By Mr. Corbett, solicitor—He said to the defendants, "I am afraid you will get into trouble about this work;" Ives said, "Do your best; you have found nothing on us;" he was standing at the Clare side of the river, and they were holding the boat against the Clare stream; the bait was under water; they were on the Tipperary side when he first saw them.

Thomas Keyes said he was an Inspector under the Board of Conservators, and before that he had been head water bailiff for 28 years; on hundreds of times he had asked parties to come ashore to be searched; he had only once been refused.

Mr. Corbett, solicitor—This has nothing to do with the case.

His Honor—Nothing.

Mr. Corbett, B.L., here read a bye-law of the Conservators.

Mr. Corbett, solicitor, said that the whole case depended on the interpretation of the clause of the Act. He submitted that the men were there in a perfectly legal way, just as legally as those in Court. It was a serious thing that people fishing on Lough Derg or the River Shannon, should be at the beck and call of a water bailiff—that if a man was to be hailed from a quarter of a mile away, through a megaphone, and did not come in, it was to be a criminal offence. He contended that a water bailiff was in the position of a policeman, and should catch his man, but he had no power to order the man to come ashore.

After further discussion, His Honor said he had no difficulty in reversing the decision of the Court below and convicting in this case. He then made an order reversing the dismiss below, and imposing a fine of £2, with 10s. expenses, one-third of the penalty to go to the complainant, and two-thirds to the Conservators.
