

DAIRY SHOW AWARDS AT ISLINGTON.

Irish Exhibits.

Entries for the annual Show of the British Farmers' Association, which opened on Saturday at Islington, although slightly less than totalled 7,107. There are comparatively few exhibits and these are mainly in the butter and poultry classes. In the butter classes awards were—For butter (free from salt) in boxes of 12 rolls—Ballymote Co-operative, 1st; Granagh Society, Ballingarry, 2nd; Springfield Society, Enniskillen, 4th. Mild cured butter (slightly salted)—Ballymote Society, 2nd; Springfield, 3rd; Glenwilliam Society, Ballingarry, Springfield, 5th; Ballyvistea Society, highly commended. Cured butter (slightly salted)—Springfield, 1st; Ballymote, 2nd; Ballyvistea, 3rd; Springfield Co-operative Society, 4th; Springfield, highly commended; Glenwilliam, commended. Butter—Ballymote, 1st; Ballyvistea, 3rd; Springfield, 4th; Belleck, 5th. In a butter making at Miss Helen M. Moore, of the Munster Institute, Cork, took third prize.
