ACTION OF IRISH INDEPENDENT CONDEMNED

At a meeting of the Newcastle West Division of the Ancient Order of Hibernians held on Sunday evening, Bro. M. Murphy, T.C. (chairman), presiding,

Mr. Wm. Phelan, J.P.; County President A.O.H., said he desired to draw the attention of the members to a matter which concerned them very closely. They were all aware that during the last couple of weeks a large number of young men left many districts in the western division of the county owing to the Militia Ballot Act scare. It was certainly very hard to defend those young men from the charge of cowardice. But at the same time the newspapers which were primarily responsible for the scare were much more to blame. He (Mr. Phelan) then proposed a-resolution condemning the Daily Independent in reference to the Militia Ballot Act. The resolution added - " They had many causes to lead to emigration over which the country had no control, but when a paper posing to be Nationalist and asserting it was the friend of the Irish it was time that the people should speak out and do all in their power to check the influence of the Independent in this direction. The people had the power in their own hands, and it was up to them to use it."

The resolution was seconded by Mr. M. Murphy, T.C., and carried unanimously.
