The evidence of Sergeant went to show that when requested, defendan refused to destroy the horse.

As well as imposing a nominal fine of one penny and 10s costs, the Bench made an order for the immediate destruction of the horse, a course in which the defendant concurred.

John Quinlan, Buree, was charged with a like offence by Sergeant Queenan, whose evidence showed that the horse was worked on the 14th ult while suffering from sores on both forelegs, which caused it to go lame.

Mr E C Winter, V.S, stated that the animal was lame in the forelegs. It was old and worn out, and should be destroyed.

The Bench made a like order in this case, and the defendant gave an undertaking to have the animal slaughtered at once.

## DEFENCE OF THE REALM ACT.

### Charges at Spike Island.

At Fort Westmoreland, Cork Harbour, yesterday, Michael Murphy, a shoemaker, of Monks-town, Co. Cork, was tried by courtmartial on charges brought under the Defence of the Realm Act, 1914. The accused was charged that he, at Queenstown, since the outbreak of the war, spread the following statement:—That any Irishman who joined the British Army was a traitor, and that if any Germans should happen to come to Ireland, every Irishman should fight with them; that he had been looking after the trenches; and that if he could give the enemy any information he would do so. Murphy was also charged with having, at Monkstown, on October 3rd, given to Lance-Corporal Scully, of the Fourth Battalion Leinster Regiment, copies of the newspaper *Irish Freedom* for circulation among young soldiers. Evidence having been given, and the prisoner having denied the charge, the Court adjourned.

## DEATH OF MR W. J. RICHARDSON.

We regret to record the death, which took place at the Hydro, Bournemouth, on the 2nd instant, of Mr Wm. Joseph Richardson, formerly of Limerick. The deceased, who was only in his 30th year, had a remarkably successful career. Beginning business life in the audit office of the Waterford and Limerick Railway, he subsequently went to Kingsbridge on the amalgamation of the system, and later on his abilities found further recognition by his appointment to the important position of Traffic Manager of the Cuban Central Railways, which he filled most ably and efficiently. He was on a visit to this country, when he contracted the illness which has ended fatally, and cut short a brilliant and distinctly successful career in the railway world. Mr Richardson was second son of the late Mr Patrick Richardson, merchant, High Street, Limerick, and nephew of Mrs James Flynn, Cruise's Hotel. The funeral is take place on the arrival of the 1.33 p.m. train to-morrow for Mount St Lawrence.
