Elizabeth M'Mahon charged Michael Hayes
 with assault. Bryan M'Mahon charged
 Michael and John Hayes with assault. The
 parties reside on adjacent farms at Drum-
 cummer. Mr. R. Fox, solicitor, appeared for
 complainants, and Mr. J. J. Power, solicitor, for
 the defendants.

Mr. Fox said the defendants were charged
 with an assault, which their worships would
 see was of a very unmanly and grievous char-
 acter. Mr. M'Mahon has a farm a very short
 distance from that of the defendants' mother,
 and for a number of years was entitled to pass
 on to Hayes's land, and then to the railway
 bridge from Bruree. On the 24th June he
 happened to be passing along with his wife
 when Mr. Michael Hayes met him. It appeared
 that some little difference had arisen between
 the Hayes and M'Mahon families some time
 before that, and the relations between them
 were of a strained character, but up to that
 time, for 40 or 50 years, no objection was
 raised to their exercising their right of way
 there. When they appeared on the field
 Michael Hayes attempted to prevent Mr. M'
 Mahon from passing and swore he would do
 so and so to him. Mrs. M'Mahon explained
 that they were entitled to exercise their right,
 whereupon he attacked both and struck the
 husband several times and also attacked the
 wife and she would prove that he struck her
 no less than ten or eleven times. Complainant
 then came to Bruree and reported the matter
 to the police and thinking discretion was the
 better part of valour they decided on going
 home by a different way where there could be
 no question of their right to use it, but when
 they came near the river who should "pop" up
 but John Hayes who was joined immediately
 by Michael who attacked the lady, knocked her
 on the ground, kicked her several times, and
 also assaulted her husband. A car was provided
 and she was taken to a house and was not able
 to attend to her business for a considerable
 time afterwards. Dr. Byrnes, J.P., examined
 her and would prove to her injuries.

Mr. Power raised a question of title, and
 after a discussion the magistrates decided on
 hearing the evidence.

Mrs. M'Mahon described the incidents of the
 occasion; Michael Hayes objected to their
 going by that way to Bruree, and struck her
 husband when he went to open the gate, and
 struck her three times, she thought; when
 going home by a different route they got into
 Hayes's by the public path; Michael and John
 Hayes came, and Michael struck, knocked and
 kicked her, and she said for the love of God
 not to murder her and she would go back; she
 lay there prostrate, and her husband had to
 provide a car to take her away.

Dr. J. J. Byrnes, J.P., gave evidence of
 having examined Mrs. M'Mahon on the
 evening in question; he found a black mark
 on the left arm, and she complained of a pain
 and tenderness about the small of the back;
 on the second occasion he found a slight
 yellow discoloration about the right breast,
 which would be consistent with a mark re-
 ceived some time previous.

Mr. St. George—Not previous to the 24th
 June?

Witness—I can't say, and she had some
 light discoloration on the leg.

Her life was not in danger? No.

To Mr. Fox—I did not consider the marks
 very grievous; it was a very dangerous place,
 the lower part of the back, but I could not find
 any mark there.

Mr. Fox—There might be internal marks?

Mrs. M'Mahon—Did you tell me that only
 for my stays I would be badly injured?

Dr. Byrnes—I think I did say that.

Did you say that only my heart was as sound
 as the wall the shock would kill me? I don't
 remember; I may have said it, but I won't
 swear to it now.

Mrs. M'Mahon was cross-examined by Mr.
 Power, but nothing material was elicited.

Mr. M'Mahon was then examined, and after
 a lengthened hearing Mr. St. George said the
 magistrates were unanimous—they were not
 going into the merits of the right of way, or
 dealing with the assault, beyond to prevent a
 repetition of it, and they would bind both
 defendants to the peace for 12 months, them-
 selves in £10 with two sureties of £5 each.

Mr. Power—We deny altogether that we
 committed these assaults.
