**Ennis Petty Sessions**  
**SCHOOL ATTENDANCE PRO-**  
**SECUTIONS**

ORDERS SOUGHT AGAINST PARENTS  
SUMMONS UNDER PUBLIC HEALTH ACT

The adjudicating magistrate at the Ennis Petty Sessions on Friday was Mr. George M'Elroy (solus).  
The Ennis Urban School Attendance Committee had three cases against Mary Scanlan, Margaret Pierce, and Mary Holohan, against whom they proceeded for attendance orders compelling them to send their children regularly to school. The complainants were represented by Messrs E Miniken, secretary, and M Millar, School Attendance Officers.

It appeared those cases required the adjudication of two justices. The Chairman, however, formally heard the facts connected with each case, but deferred making the attendance order until the subsequent court, at which, at the same time, he told the defaulting parents they need not attend.

The Attendance Officer showed that Mary Scanlan's child had attended but 22 days out of the period of 110 days.

Defendant said her child had a sore foot for part of the time, while she sent her to school on other days.

Mr. Miniken stated defendant never gave any reasonable excuse to the Committee—the excuse even about the child having a sore foot; but defendant, contradicting this statement, said she told that to the Committee.

The Chairman—We will send the child to the Industrial School if you can't send her to school.

"I would just as live she would be sent there," replied defendant.

In the case of Margaret Pierce, the School Attendance Officer informed the Bench her child had attended school but 14 days in the school going period.

Defendant stated she sent the child to school every day, and if he did not go she could not help it. She could get no good of her two boys since her husband went in the army.

Chairman—How much separation allowance are you getting now? £1 a week, sir.

Chairman—You are in a better position now to look after your children.

Mr. Miniken mentioned he intended to write to the military authorities to have payment of separation allowance stopped to those parties unless they sent their children to school.

Chairman—You ought be well able to see your children are in school every day.

Defendant—I am not able to run out with an infant in the bad weather to see if they have gone to school.

Chairman—You are able to run about publichouses, and be brought up for drunkenness. I don't think it would be too much for you to see if your children are at school every day.

Mary Holohan told his worship she sent her girl to school every day, and she thought there must be some mistake in not marking her present.

Orders to have the parents send their children to school were adjourned.

In the case of the Ennis Rural District Council against Mr. Marcus Patterson, Clifden, under the Public Health Act, requiring the abatement of a nuisance in a house occupied by a man named Patrick Egan, Mr. M'Namara, solicitor, made application, on behalf of Mr. J. B. Lynch, solicitor, for an adjournment, he being absent in Dublin.

Mr. Mahon, C.P.S., mentioned that Mr. Hickman, solicitor, asked him to have the case adjourned for four weeks.

Patrick Commans, Kilnamona, had a woman named Cullinan summoned, charging her with having used threatening and abusive language towards him.

**Dromcollogher Hibernians**

**THE FUNERAL OBSEQUIES**
