

THE FUNERAL OBSEQUIES  
Amidst every manifestation of sorrow, and in the presence of a large and representative concourse of mourners, the mortal remains of the above deeply lamented gentleman were interred on Thursday afternoon, 26th ult., in the New Cemetery adjacent to St. Mary's Church, Rathkeale. Deceased was father of Mr. P. J. ### LARCENY OF MONEY Case at Connaught Winter Assizes ACCUSED FOUND GUILTY SENTENCE OF SEVEN MONTHS' IMPRISONMENT IMPOSED

At the Connaught Winter Assizes, Wednesday afternoon, a returned American, John Driscoll, of Westport, was charged with the larceny of £14, the property of a man named John Campbell, also of the same town. Mr. Blackall, B.L. (instructed by Blackall, solicitor), appeared for the accused, who pleaded not guilty.

From the evidence of the prosecution it appears that both parties were travelling from America to Westport on the same steamer. They became known to each other, and became so familiar that the prosecutor lent the accused his razor; they travelled together to Athenry, where they drank; afterwards the accused induced the prosecutor to enter a field where the prosecutor all the accused demanded his money, and the prosecutor refusing to give it up, the prosecutor pounced on him, knocked him down, and extracted the money from him.

In answer to Mr. Blackall, witness stated that he was drunk on the occasion, and could not resist the attempt of Driscoll (witness's hand was blood-poisoned) and he had not the use of it; he denied that he was drunk on the occasion or that he had been found asleep owing to not sleeping; when leaving America he had about £18 in his possession.

Police evidence was given to the effect that a sum of £2 was found on the prisoner at his arrest, concealed in the end of his shirt.

Mr. Blackall addressed the jury, and asked them to be very slow to convict such a case. If the prisoner had stolen money that was alleged it was only £2 was in his possession.

His Lordship, in summing up, stated that the jury was not satisfied that the prisoner had stolen the £14 they could find him guilty of the larceny of the £2 found on him.

The jury found the prisoner guilty of the larceny of £2, and his Lordship sentenced him to seven months' imprisonment from the date of his arrest.

### HEALTHY ANIMAL
