West Limerick Tragedy CATTLE DEALER KILLED

SAD FATALITY AT NEWCASTLE WEST

CLARE MAN THE VICTIM

A sad tragedy occurred at Newcastle West Railway Station on yesterday evening, the victim being Mr Patrick Meaney, an extensive Clare cattle buyer. The great December cattle fair of Newcastle West was held on yesterday, and owing to having it larger than usual, and a brisk sale for all classes of animals, it appears that there was not a sufficiency of wagons at first, and that Mr. Meaney, who had purchased over 40 head of cattle, went to the railway station to provide wagons for them. The railway officials then shunted some fresh wagons to the siding, and as there was a rush for the wagons by the dealers and jobbers, it appears Mr. Meaney, in his endeavour to secure a wagon, was pushed under while the train was in motion, and before it could be stopped he had sustained serious injuries, his legs and arms having been broken in several places. He was removed with all promptitude to the waiting room of the railway station, where Dr. Ambrose and Rev. Father Hayes did everything possible to relieve his sufferings. Dr. Ambrose had him removed immediately to the workhouse hospital, where he expired soon after admission.

Pope's Suggestion

GERMANY'S REPLY

Copenhagen, Friday.

A private message from Berlin states that Germany answered the Pope's suggestion for a Christmas armistice, declaring that the Germans are willing to agree if their enemies will.

SERBIANS REPULSE AUSTRIANS

Mine Amidst Italian Fleet

A Rome *Messagero's* Nish despatch says that the Serbians repulsed Austrian fugitives beyond Drina. Nearly all the Austrian Slavs surrendered, while others fled, throwing away their arms. An Austrian mine was discovered off Taranto in the midst of the Italian fleet.

Serbian Take Many Prisoners

The Central News says that an official message states that in the fighting from December 3rd to the 7th that the Serbians took 95 officers and 16,000 men prisoners, and captured 50 guns, 36 Maxims, and an enormous quantity of war material.

A Nish telegram says that on the 9th and 10th the Serbians took another ten thousand prisoners. The total Austrian losses are estimated at fifty thousand.

German Officers in Alexandretta

Athens, Thursday.

Three hundred German officers have passed through Alexandretta and four thousand German troops are expected there.

LECTURE IN THE ATHENÆUM
