CORK POLICE SERGEANT'S DEATH.

Ar nquest was held on Thursday at Donoughmore by Mr Coroner J J Horgar, solr, into the circumstances touching the death of Sergeant Patrick O'Brien, R.I.C, a native of Glin, Co. Limerick, who was found dead in his room at the police barracks on Tuesday, 15th inst.

Sergeant Denny and Head-Constable Wood represented the police, and a jury, of which Mr T M Casey was foreman, having been sworn,

Constable Henihan, Donoughmore, stated that about 9 o'elock on the day in question from information he received he went to deceased's room, where he found him lying dead on the floor with a gan that had recently been discharged.

Dr Timothy Crowley, Donoughmore, stated that he had made an examination of the body, and found the left eye shattered. At the top of the head there was a hole where the bullet had come out.

A Jujor-Could it be possible, doctor, that the occurrence was accidental?

Dr Crowley—It is possible. HeadsConstable Wood stated that he knew deceased and as far as witness was aware de ceased was in no trouble.

The Coroner said that the circumstances of the case were peculiarly sad. Decased was a very respectable officer. He, on behalf of the jury, expressed regretat the occurrence.

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SHOP HOLIDAYS.

Regulations for the Christmas Season.

The Home Office has issued a circular for the guidance of shopkeepers in regard to the closing of shops on certain days during the Christmas and New Year holidays.

The circular states that the shopkeeper will not be required to give the asseitants a halfholiday in the week preceding Caristmas week if he gives them a whole-holiday on Christmas Day and a half-holiday or a whole holiday on Boxing Day. He should, if Saturday is not the ordinary day for the assistants' half-hotiday, put up a notice in his shop in the official form stating that
