NENAGH MAN KILLED AT THE FRONT

Great sympathy is felt in Nenagh and district on the death of Captain Hon Reginald Prittie, second son of the Right Hon Lord Dunally, D.L., Kilboy House, Nenagh, who received a telegram on Christmas Eve to the effect that his son was killed at the front.
