LEG CAUGHT IN STIRRUP

EAST LIMERICK FARMER'S ADVENTURE

On St. Stephen's Day, as Patrick Hurley,
Farmer, Tobernea, Kilmallock, was riding a
horse along the road the animal took fright at
some "wren trees" decorated in the usual cus-
tom, which were carried by young boys. The
horse galloped off and dislodged the rider,
whose leg was caught in the stirrup, and he
was dragged some distance, in the course of
which he is believed to have been kicked by the
horse. Mr. Hurley managed to get his leg free
from the stirrup, and when picked up was
found to have received a cut on the head and
marks on the body.

NENAGH MAN KILLED AT THE FRONT

Great sympathy is felt in Nenagh and dis-
trict on the death of Captain Hon Reginald
Prittie, second son of the Right Hon Lord
Dunally, D.L., Kilboy House, Nenagh, who
received a telegram on Christmas Eve to the
effect that his son was killed at the front.
Only a few weeks ago the President of the
French Republic bestowed on Captain Prittie
one of the most coveted decorations, that of
the Legion of Honour, for his gallantry dur-
ing the battle of the Marne. The late Captain
Prittie was a very good sportsman, and was a
great favourite in the district, and his death
is much regretted. He was attached to the
Royal Irish Rifles. The deceased fought as a
distinguished Tipperary soldier should fight,
with conspicuous dash, daring and gallantry.
Covered with glory, he lost his life as a soldier
in action in the firing line. His sorrowing
mother, and the sorrowing mothers of Tipper-
ary whose loved ones have fallen, will have the
prayers and sympathies of the kind-hearted
people in every part of the country.

At a meeting of the Nenagh Belgian Relief
Committee in the Town Hall on Christmas
Eve, Mrs. H. F. Powell presiding, the follow-
ing resolution was passed, on the motion of Mr.
F. R. Maloney, J.P., seconded by the lady
chairman:—"That we express our profound
regret for the loss of the noble young officer,
Hon. Captain Reginald Prittie, who met his
death as a heroic soldier on the battlefield, and
that we tender to his bereaved mother, the
Lady Dunally, our heartfelt sympathy and
condolence in this hour of dark mourning and
deep sorrow for her gifted and gallant son."
