After the Boer surrender at Paardeburg, Sir Thomas led the British in the successful action at Dreifontein. This cleared the way towards the advance on Bloemfontein. Here, in the capital of the Free State, General Kelly-Kenny's other abilities came into play. He was placed in charge of the communications, which the Boers were constantly attempting to cut. General Kelly-Kenny remained in charge, with an oversight over all the operations in the Free State, until he came home to England in 1901.

Other important duties remained for the great leader here. He was Adjutant-General of the Forces until 1904; and he retired in 1907 with fifty years' service to his credit. General Kelly-Kenny enjoyed the confidence and friendship of King Edward VII, and was selected by his Majesty to accompany Prince Arthur of Connaught on his mission to Japan in 1906.

General Kelly-Kenny was a bluff and hearty Irishman, with the traditional humour of his race. He was awarded many distinguished orders including G.C.B. and the G.C.V.O.

COUNTY OF LIMERICK.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, pursuant to the directions of the Local Government Board for Ireland in their circular letter of 10th August, 1914, that W. R. Gubbins, Esquire, Chairman of the County Council of the County of Limerick, has established a Local Committee for the County of Limerick to act in

Motor Omnibus or other vehicle, being a hackney carriage within the meaning of Section 4 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1888, nor to any Motor Fire Engine or Ambulance.

Every person liable to the payment of any of the above Duties is required by the Acts to fill up and sign a Declaration which is to be delivered to the proper Officer before the expiration of the Month of January or before the expiration of twenty-one days from the date when such person shall first incur liability. The Penalty for not delivering a Declaration or for making an untrue Declaration is £20.

A Penalty of £20 (over and above the Duty) also incurred by every person keeping a Motor Car without having taken out the Licence required by Law.

Forms of declaration may be obtained at any one Order Office in Ireland. In order, however, that the proceeds of Motor Licences may go to the credit of the County of Limerick, it is necessary that application for a Licence should be made to the Kilmaallock Post Office (not to the G.P.O., Limerick), as Kilmaallock is the only Office authorised to issue Licences for the County of Limerick.
