In fact the greater part of the soil of the Belgian market gardens has been made on waste and barren ground by the cultivators themselves. The committee hope to get the funds for starting the scheme from two sources. The Board of Agriculture have suggested that they might apply to the Development Commissioners for grants for the local demonstrations of intensive culture, as the object is educational. As regards the housing of the families constituting the co-operative settlement, temporary accommodation will have at first to be found; but it is hoped that when the schemes have been started the means for providing permanent housing will be obtained under the provisions of the Housing (No. 2) Act.
